

PRAYS FOR DAMAGES

Breach of Promise Suit Against Cottage Grove Man.

FRED G. LUEBKE DEFENDANT.

Mary Falter Alleges That Her Intended Husband Refused to Make Good, Greatly to Her Financial Injury.—Asks for Cold Cash.

Fred G. Luebke of this city was yesterday made defendant in a breach of promise suit, Mary Falter of Clayton, Washington, being the complainant, and filing suit in this county through her attorney. She asks damages in the sum of \$2790, and among other things alleges that on September 15, 1907, the defendant promised to marry her and in October following, at the request of the defendant, she expended considerable amounts of money and sacrificed much in the disposition of her property at Clayton, Wash., in order that she might come to Cottage Grove to carry out her part of the marriage contract, and that the defendant, on the arrival of the plaintiff at Cottage Grove, had the date of the marriage indefinitely postponed and that had since refused and neglected to marry her.

VALLEY LEAGUE ORGANIZED.

Senator Bingham Heads New Baseball Association.

A number of Cottage Grove fans attended a meeting at Eugene last Sunday, the purpose of which was to launch the Willamette Baseball League. A considerable amount of enthusiasm was displayed by the lovers of the national game. I. H. Bingham was elected president of the league, and J. J. McCormick vice-president, W. Wallace of Cottage Grove being the choice for secretary and treasurer. The season will open on Sunday, April 17, and end about the middle of July. Games will be played every Sunday and on holidays. The reason that the season ends so early is that in the heat of the Summer, when so many people are out of the cities at the Summer resorts, the attendance is always poor, while in the Spring and early Summer there are always large crowds at the games.

Lee Driver and Williams Eagles are back of the Albany team, J. J. McCormick and Sid Smith will manage the Eugene team, and David Griggs and Orville Knapp at Cottage Grove. Just who will manage the Springfield team is not yet given out, but that city is certain to be represented in the league. Eugene and Springfield will use the same grounds midway between the two cities, on the electric car line.

CONSTRUCTION UNDER WAY.

Botsford Lumber Company Erecting Sawmill in Cottage Grove.

The Botsford Lumber company of Portland, of whom The Sentinel spoke last week as making preparations for the erection of a sawmill in Cottage Grove, has this week inaugurated building operations, and already has the structure well under way. The new plant will be located alongside the railroad tracks, between the Brown Lumber Company's mill and the fruit dryer, and will be ready for business within thirty days. A force of fifteen workmen is at present engaged in construction work. The company will bring its logs into the city over the Oregon & Southeastern road.
