More Assessable Property.

The state tax commission has declared that all railroad, sleeping car, union station and depot, electric and street railway, express, telegraph, telephone, refrigerator car and oil and tank line companies, whether doing business in one county or more, are to be assessed hereafter.

Attorney-General Crawford, to whom the question was referred, takes the same view of the matter. He quotes paragraph 15 of section 4 of chapter 218, laws of 1909, known as the tax code, in support of his position. The list, provided the company is doing business as one system, partly within this state and partly without, or so doing business in more than one county of the state, includes all heat, light, power, water, gas and electric companies. Where the operations of any such company are confined to one county, all the property of the company is subject to assessment by the county assessor.

Coming to Bohemia Camp.
