Wynne; baritone, Lloyd Bisby; flute, Dr. A. W. Kime; organist, Mrs. Robt. Sutcliffe. At intervals during the rendition, the choir was given a brief respite by the delivery of short addresses, by Rev. Sutcliffe, pastor of the church, and Miss Lilly, a missionary to India, who is making a lecture tour of the coast states. The solos by Mrs. Van Winkle and Ren Sanford, duets by Mrs. W. C. Conner and Armored Sutcliffe, and Dr. J. O. VanWinkle and Miss Sutcliffe, the Misses Whitsett, Hazelton and Mrs. Van Winkle and others were well rendered.

"The Gift of the Graces," the Easter cantata given by the Sunday school and Christian Endeavor society of the Christian church Sunday evening, was greatly enjoyed by the large crowd in attendance. The chorus by the larger children of the Sunday school and the motion song by the little tots were very pleasing, while the three graces, Misses Elsie Brewer, Clara Grooms and Audrey Langdon sustained their parts well, but the two little orphan children, represented by Maudie Kirkpatrick and Claude Kime, and the heathen girl by Eva Southworth, touched the hearts of all present, making this a very effective cantata and considered one of the best ever given here. Two quartets were rendered and also special music by the choir. The appeal for the offering by Dan Woods pleased the audience and resulted in a large offering, part of which will be sent to help support the orphan home in St. Louis and part to Damoh, India, the foreign field.
