TAKE SHOT AT PINCHOT.

Miners Say Forestry Department Still Ruled by the Beheaded.

Rebellion against present conservation methods, which they declare are retarding prospecting and mineral development in Oregon, as well as in other states, was started last night at a special meeting of the Oregon Branch of the American Mining Congress. The plan of starting a campaign against "Pinchotism," which, the members say, is still ruling the Forestry Department, was decided upon at the conference. After discussing the matter of better conservation methods, the miners decided to call a special meeting of a week from next Friday night, when it is expected to arrange for bringing their complaint before Congress through the aid of Oregon senators and representatives.

I. N. Muncey, chairman of the State Mining Commission, and owner of a copper mine in the Siskiyou Forest Re-

serve, stated that the rules imposed by the Forestry Department are contrary in many instances to the Federal laws. One instance of this, he said, was the rule made by the Forestry Department limiting the use of timber for mining purposes, while the law permitted miners to get timber anywhere for use of mines.

C. W. Riddell, a local mining engineer, asserted that the rules of the Forestry Department were a detriment to the mining development of Oregon and was contrary to good judgment. He complained that the mining experts sent out here by the government in behalf of the conservation interests were not mining experts and made serious mistakes. He told of instances in which promising prospects has to be abandoned because the young men sent out here from Washington knew nothing of their importance.

"Mines are not really found," said Mr. Riddell, "but are developed. If the Government is not going to let you work anything but a paying mine, but few mines will ever be located in the forest reserves."

"In the Cascade reserves and in Southern Oregon districts there are promising mineral deposits which miners cannot prospect, owing to the unreasonable rules of the Forestry Department."—Oregonian.

W. C. T. U. CONVENTION.

The W. C. T. U. of Cottage Grove will have an Echo meeting this afternoon at 3 o'clock, at the residence of Mrs. W. C. Johnson, at which a report from the Lane county Institute will be given.

The Lane county W. C. T. U. Institute was held in Eugene, April 5 and 6. On roll call of Unions, Riverside, Creswell and Cottage Grove responded. Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Woods represented Cottage Grove.

Department work of scientific temperance instruction; mothers' meetings; Sunday school and press work were brought before the institute and discussed, interspersed by several fine vocal selections.

Tuesday evening was devoted to an excellent address by State President Ada Wallace Unruh, which was inspiring, helpful and instructive.

Wednesday forenoon was opened in a very touching praise service led by Mrs. J. O. Richmond of Springfield, who is county superintendent of evangelistic work. Department work of medal contests, lumbermen and miners, social and red letter days were taken up and discussed. Special music was kindly furnished. Noon prayer and a big dinner at the church followed in which the husbands and children joined.

Wednesday afternoon was opened by Devotional service, led by Mrs. Lizzie Norris of Eugene. Duet by Mrs. Garret and Miss Garret. Flower Mission work, L. T. L. work and Legislation were taken up by those appointed, followed by a general discussion. A legislation quiz by Mrs. Johnson of Creswell was instructive.

Wednesday evening was spent in devotions and special music, given by the Christian church orchestra. The Matrons Medal Contest, was won by Mrs. Robb of Eugene.

Hill Figuring On the McKenzie.

An employe of the Utah Construction Company, building the Natron extension of the Southern Pacific, when in Eugene, stated that a corps of Hill surveyors has crossed the Cascades over the McKenzie River pass from Eastern Oregon and is headed toward that city. It has been talked for some time that Hill was endeavoring to invade the Willamette Valley through the McKenzie pass and the crew of engineers, who have just crossed the mountains, it is presumed, are making a preliminary survey of a line which will

connect to the Oregon Electric on its extension up the Willamette Valley, with a road to Coos Bay.

Crater Lake Road.

The Carter Lake road will be built. Government approval of the project has been secured by Will G. Steel, a recognition appropriation of \$5000 made, Engineer B. F. Heidle sent by the government to Medford and the promise given that 50 per cent of the work will have been accomplished by July 1 of this year. The Medford Commercial club's subscription of \$25,000 for the construction of the road is well under way and there will be no further delays. Mr. Steel has just returned from Washington. He represented the Medford Commercial club and intervened on its behalf with Secretary of the Interior Ballinger and other government officials.

"The government's approval of the Crater Lake road in effect nullifies the decree handed down by the supreme court last month," says Mr. Steel. "I found about the halls of the capitol a feeling of resentment that even so august a body as the supreme court should deem the Crater Lake National park a local affair, any more than that Yellowstone National park should be so considered."

It is probable that Cottage Grove will have a float in the Portland Rose Festival parade, June 6-11.
