State Game Warden R. O. DUST OF THE DIAMOND.

The Willamette Valley League schedule begins on Sunday, April 17, and the several teams comprising it are practicing diligently. There has been considerable strife in securing the very best of talent, and it remains to be seen how well the different managements have succeeded. It is believed that Cottage Grove will line up with the top-notchers, and that it will be in the game from start to finish. George Baker, a twirler well known to the fans of this valley, and Mr. Fields of Sacramento, California, who has made good in some of the minor leagues of that state, will occupy the box, and those who have seen the workout predict that the opposition will have to go some to beat them to it. Warren McFarland and W. Morley will stop them. Earl Hill will linger at first; M. Inch, of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, at second; and Francis P. Kurtz at third, while B. B. Groff, Bud Lincoln and R. Landwere will pick posies in the greenward.

The first of game will be with Eugene although the original schedule named Albany as the first to meet Cottage Grove in this city. On the same date Albany will meet Springfield at Midway park. The grounds in this city have been placed in fine condition and the grandstand extended to accommodate at least an additional two hundred patrons.

ALBANY'S STRONG TEAM.

Dr. J. H. Kavanaugh, manager of the Albany team of the Willamette Valley league, has completed the personnel of the local team. The pitchers will be W. A. Salisbury and Ernest Wicks. Salisbury has had many years of experience in league baseball and pitched for Portland when that city won the championship of the old Northwest league. Salisbury will also serve as captain. Wicks, the other pitcher, is an Ashland boy who played last year in the California Inland league. M. A. Chapin of Portland, a leading player of the old Willamette Valley league, has been signed as catcher. Claire B. Baker and Eugene Dooley, both of Albany, will alternate at first base. Baker has played in the best teams of the Willamette valley for several years, and Dooley has played first base on the Columbia university team in Portland and has also played several years on local teams. Claude Swan, the famous Oregon Agricultural college athlete, will play second base. Lyman Shorey of Woodburn, who played shortstop for the Woodburn team of the Tri-City league when it won the pennant, will play shortstop. The third baseman will be either John Wesley or Danny Sutherland of Shedd's, who has played with Corvallis, Lebanon and Albany. Three outfielders who have been signed are George Dooley of Albany, Hamon Bilyeu of Corvallis and Paul Driver of Tagent, who has played with Eugene and Albany.

STATE GRANGE MEETING.

Large Gathering Expected to Attend Annual Session.

About five hundred members are expected to attend the State Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, at Oregon City, May 10. The first day will be devoted largely to the reception usually given representatives from the different Granges. In the evening there will be a general reception and the mayor will deliver the address of welcome to the delegates.

The lecturers' conference has been set for May 11, by State Lecturer Johnson. Its object will be to discuss the educational work of the order and to adopt plans for improvement. It will be the second conference of the kind ever held in the state. Lecturers are from the local Granges and are not necessarily delegates. The conference is expected to increase the attendance by 50 or 75 per cent and will be made a permanent feature of the State Grange.

At this session of the State Grange election of officers for the ensuing two years will be held. According to the rules of the order, no one can become an active candidate or canvass for the election of any one to office. The principal officers are those of master and state lecturer. The former has charge of the general policy of the order and the state lecturer superintends the educational work. The good roads question, postal savings banks, the initiative and referendum and revision of taxation laws will be discussed at the convention.

Running Short Time.

The tie plant at Latham finds it difficult to get a sufficient number of ties from the mills to keep the plant operating single shift. The plant can "cure" about 4000 ties per day, but at the present time only about half that number is coming in, and consequently but a day force is kept on the job.
