FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

Commercial Club Invites Noted Agriculturist to Visit Cottage Grove.

At a meeting of the Commercial club Monday evening it was decided to hold a Farmers' Institute in Cottage Grove in the near future, the date depending upon the convenience of Dr. James Whithycomb and others of the Oregon Agricultural College experimental station, and State Dairy Commissioner Bailey, which gentlemen will be in attendance and deliver addresses. The meeting will be held at the rooms of the Commercial club, and every farmer and dairyman of this section will be invited to be present and participate in the program, which will be announced in The Sentinel after the arrangements shall have been perfected. Such gatherings must necessarily prove beneficial to the farmer, and that there will be a large attendance on this occasion The Sentinel doubts not. There are a large number of new-comers in this locality, and these especially will find interest in the meeting because of their unfamiliarity with conditions in the coast country.
