ask you, is there any one of the products I have mentioned that will not produce more than \$12.50 per acre, here.

Now, gentlemen, I have seen my father try to raise hogs in that country, and have seen, and so have you who have lived in Nebraska, Iowa, Ohio, Illinois, or any of the eastern States, whole droves of fine fat hogs wiped off the face of the earth in a fortnight by cholera. Is it so here? No. I could have taken you, twenty years ago, across the plains of Kansas, Nebraska, and Texas, and shown you miles and miles of white bones bleaching in the sun, representing thousands of cattle that had been driven before the freezing, blinding snow of those northern winds and blizzards until at last they perished in their tracks. Can you find those conditions prevailing here, or do you know of any one who has even known of them?

Have you not gone out to your poultry houses in the east and found the eggs frozen and bursted twenty minutes after they were laid, and perhaps the hens that laid them also frozen and dead under the roost? I have. Have you ever seen such conditions here? So I say to you, why are not these climatic conditions favorable, and why is it not possible to raise these products of the farm at a profit?

So, now, gentlemen, I wish to say to you that if there is a single statement in that booklet that is misleading, A. B. Wood, C. E. Stewart, J. F. Spray, T. C. Wheeler, F. B. Phillips and myself are responsible for it, and I also want to say that it is our undeveloped resources that we want to push and develop. If we can raise one acre of pears, peaches, prunes, and plums we can raise a 1000, and if we can make money from one cow we can make money from a 100. If we were in a prairie country, with no timber we would have gone out and gotten a photograph of some poplar, or cottonwood, or maple grove, and then advertised that timber could be grown here, but in this case the timber is grown and developed and is already being cut from the land faster by far than the lands are being developed.

So, I say to you, farm your valleys as they should be, develop your hill lands and plant it to fruit and vegetables and produce something; put your country in a position where you are able to buy from your merchant a can of corn or beans, apples, pears, cherries, or other fruits that are not shipped into your community from neighboring states, when you own will produce more and better than they if you only work and develop it.

CONTINUE TO BOOST.

The question now is, will you continue the work that has been started? As for myself I do not care to live in a community that will not boost. When ever you reach a point where you feel your work is finished, that you do not need to do more, just that minute you will begin to retrograde. The only way to advance is to have something doing every minute—\$3000 will continue this work for another year and I would recommend, as chairman, that this be done, and all get in the harness and boost for Cottage Grove, Nesmith county and a greater Oregon.

I thank you all for the loyal support you have given us in the past year and only regret that I had not time to prepare and render you a more detailed report than I have.
