"Prof. Huxley's Test of Life" will be discussed by Rev. Sutcliffe at the Methodist church Sunday morning. At the evening service Mrs. Frank Wheeler, in connection with the choir, will give the beautiful continuous reading entitled, "The Saving of Daddy." This was given by Mrs. Wheeler at the recent W. C. T. U. convention at Hood River and received flattering notices in the local press.

The Rev. Robert Sutcliffe will conduct public worship at the Latham school house Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Subject of his address, "The Shepherd Psalm."

It is the purpose of the applicant to enlarge his present building to that extent, and put a handsome plate glass front in the entire structure. He will set the structure back to the established line, and deed to the city the five feet sidewalk space now occupied by his store. This will be an improvement that will add very materially to the appearance of Main street. The erection of a wooden addition to the present building will not jeopardize adjoining property other than his own, which is at a safe distance.

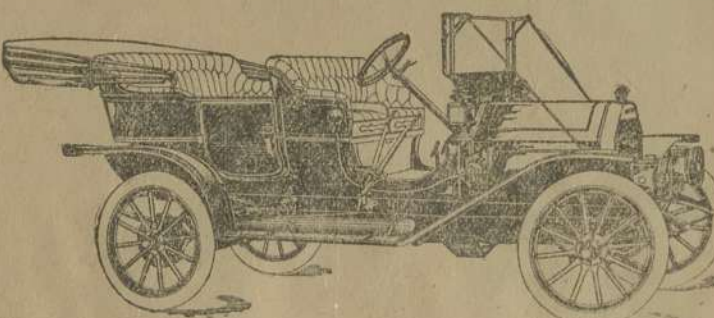
