TOPICS FOR DISCUSSION BY PASTORS NEXT SUNDAY.

Last of Unitarian Meetings Unless Society is Organized.—Religious News in General.

The fourth Unitarian service of the series began the first Friday evening in June, will be held in Phillips' hall this evening at eight o'clock. All who are interested in these meetings should be present tonight, for it will be decided whether the services shall continue. The sermon this evening will be on "The Religion of an Understanding Heart."

"The Value of a Child" is the subject of the discourse at the Christian church Sunday morning. This will be the first of a series on the "Teachings of Jesus." The evening subject, "Man and the Church," Bible school and Christian Endeavor at the usual hours.

DILLARD WORKS OUT PLAN.

Would Have Better Supervision of the Country Schools.

Better supervision of country schools is the purpose of a plan submitted to the educational conference Tuesday by Superintendent W. B. Dillard, of Lane county, says The Register. The plan is being considered by educators, and it is likely it will be submitted to the state legislature with the hope that it may be enacted into law.

Briefly, the plan is that groups of from five to twenty school districts may combine and employ a competent school man to supervise the work in the combined districts. A petition of one-third of the voters in each district of the proposed supervisory district shall be sufficient to cause the county boundary board to call an election in the districts affected, and a majority of all votes cast shall decide the question.

There shall be a supervisory district board, consisting of one person from each school district of the supervisory district chosen for three years. They shall have power to hire a supervisor to devote his whole time to the schools of the district. Half the salary of the supervisor is to come from the general funds of the county and the other half from a special tax of the district.

The supervisor is to have direction of all the teachers, and may discharge for incompetency, subject to review of the county superintendent.

The purpose of the proposed plan is to secure better schools, especially in the country districts, where so often the teachers are not well prepared for teaching. Payment of half the supervisor's salary from the general funds of the county makes the plan attractive for the country districts, and also serves to even up for the Union High school tax, which favors the cities already maintaining high schools.

Bootleggers Get Theirs.

Harry Tracy, a youth whose parents live in Eugene, was sentenced to serve a term of thirty days in the county jail by Judge Harris, of the circuit court, he having pleaded guilty to the charge of bootlegging. Tracy is accused of selling liquor to a number of men at Wendling, where he was employed.

Fred Shepard, of Wendling, was indicted on five counts for bootlegging and one for giving liquor to a minor. He entered a plea of guilty.—Guard.

ANNUAL SHOOT FOR GUARD

COTTAGE GROVE WILL SEND TEAM TO RETAIN THE CUP.

Rifle Competition of O. N. G. Scheduled for July 12-14 at Clackamas Range.

The annual rifle competition of the Oregon National guard will take place July 12 to 14, on the new rifle range at Clackamas station, near Oregon City. Every company of guardsmen in the state will be represented by a team composed of its best shots. The program prepared by Adjutant General Finzer provides for five big events, four for riflemen and one for pistol shots. In addition to these events, which will be exclusively for members of the guard, there are to be three competitions under the auspices of the Oregon State Rifle association which civilians may enter. Cottage Grove will furnish one team. Eugene will send two teams, and one team will come from each of the following interior points: Astoria, Salem, Albany, Baker City, Pendleton and Woodburn. By far the most important competition is the state trophy match. This match was won last year by a team from the Cottage Grove company, and it is understood that Captain Lawson, commander of this company, is confident that his team will again win the trophy. Under the rules governing this competition, it must be won three straight years before it becomes the property of any one company.

Picked squads of eight men from each of the two regiments will contest for the Governor's trophy. This trophy has been won for the past years by the Fourth regiment. The match which will determine who is the best shot in the state national guard will be the hardest fought contest of the competitive meet. This contest, which is known as the state individual, is expected to bring out a large number of contestants. In this match, as in the regimental contest, the ranges will be 200 yards at rapid fire and 600 and 100 yards at slow fire, and in addition there will be the usual skirmish run. General Finzer, who will himself serve as executive officer of the camp, has not yet selected the camp and range officers.

GIVE US MORE COUNTIES

IMPORTANT FACTORS IN DEVELOPMENT OF OREGON.

Probably Seven Initiative Petitions Will Be Filed Before July 7, the Last Day.

Initiative petitions have been presented at the office of the secretary of state which propose by direct enactment to create five new Oregon counties next November and petitions are still being circulated in different parts of the state asking the electorate to create two additional ones, making the list of new counties to be created by the people at the next general election a total of seven, and it is a pity that the number is not seventeen. New counties will develop the state more rapidly and more surely than anything else. They will create new centers of activity, populate and improve undeveloped territory, thus adding to the valuation of the state, and give the people what they crave, self-government. Four of these new counties are to be located in eastern Oregon and three in western Oregon.

Petitions have already been presented for the creation of Nesmith, Williams and Umpqua counties. These counties are to be located in the upper Willamette valley, and will depend for their territory on the counties of Lane and Douglas. Williams county is promoted for the evident purpose of defeating Nesmith. Its boundaries overlaps proposed Nesmith. Williams was started after the people of Douglas and Lane found it impossible to down Nesmith's popularity with the voters of the state, the measure being considered just in every respect.

REDMOND AMBITIOUS.

In eastern Oregon proposals have been so far consummated as to bring about the filing of petitions for the creation of Otis county from parts of Malheur, Harney and Grant; Orchard county mainly from northeastern Umatilla, and Clarke county mainly from north portion of Grant county. Petitions are being circulated for the creation of Deschutes county out of the north portion of Crook. Redmond will be made the county seat of Deschutes county, the boundary excluding Bend by about six miles and Prineville about four miles.

Such is the county situation as presented by the initiative. All petitions must be filed by July 7, and arguments in their favor by July 4. The indications are that by that time there will be at least 31 measures on the ballot of the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8, and now county proposals are being made.

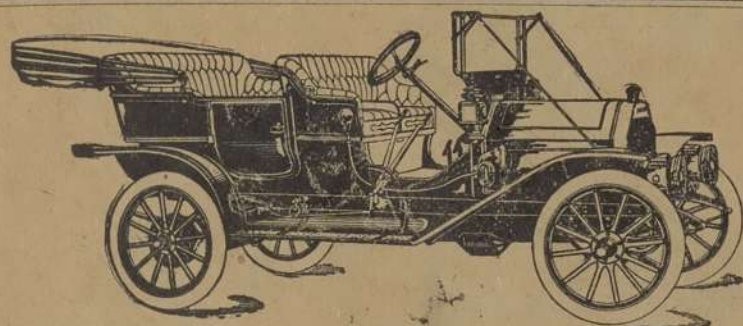
