

PLAN FOR SWEET PEA SHOW

WOMAN'S CLUB FIX DATES JULY EIGHT AND NINE.

Premium List as Arranged Practically Same as Last Year—Street Parade on Last Day.

The annual Sweet Pea Show will be held in the Lawson building on Main street July 8 and 9, under the auspices of the Woman's Club, arrangements for which have been completed. The list of prizes is practically the same as that of a year ago. There will be a parade, as on previous occasions, and other features that will prove of interest have been arranged for. The complete program is herewith published:

Class I.—For the largest number of varieties grown by an exhibitor, not less than the named varieties, twelve sprays in a vase. These will be judged as to quality. First and second prize.

Class II.—Best six varieties, named, twelve sprays each, Cream, Pink, White, Dark Red, Red and Lavender. Prize for each color.

Class III.—Prize for the most unique display. Prize for the most artistically arranged bouquet.

Class IV.—Largest display, regardless of color or variety, but colors must be arranged separately. First and second prizes.

All classes open to competition to anyone living within a radius of ten miles of Cottage Grove.

A prize of \$1.00 will be given to the boy under 15 having the finest display of wild flowers.

The same for girls.

The best three bouquets of roses, regardless of color or variety, will be entitled to the blue, red and white ribbons.

A prize will be given to the person exhibiting the finest potted plant.

CRACK SHOTS IMPROVE.

Range Contest Shows 40 Points Better Work Than Year Ago.

The rifle team of Company E, which will enter the contest on the Clackamas range this month, has shown marked improvement over the record made last year, and the team that beats it will have to do extraordinary work. The aggregate average last year, the record that won the cup, was 465 points, while this year eight times over the range in practice gives the team 505 points, or forty higher than one year ago. Company K, of the Third regiment, was a close second last year, being only three points behind the Cottage Grove team.

Capt. Johnson has been detailed a range officer at Camp Clackamas, and will be second officer in the supervision of the contest. Capt. Johnson has recently been appointed captain of commissary and subsistence on Col. Yoran's staff, made vacant by the resignation of Capt. Lawson.

Cottage Grove should be proud of the fact that it will be represented at American Lake this year in the joint maneuvers of the U. S. Army and the National Guard. The Guard has been recruited with a sufficient number of men to hold the company here. It is necessary to have 41 enlisted men to participate in camp duties, and this number has been secured.

Company E will undoubtedly do some hard work during the six weeks intervening between now and the date of the encampment at American Lake. Capt. Lawson has changed the night of drill to Saturday in order to convene a number of out-of-town soldiers.

MAY ORGANIZE A COMPANY

PAVING USED IN MINNESOTA IS CONSIDERED GOOD.

Requires Crushed Stone, Cement and Ordinary Coal Tar.—How the Material Is Laid.

Several citizens have become interested in the paving described in The Sentinel last week, used in Mantato, Minnesota, and may organize a company here for laying the material. It is a crushed stone, cement and coal tar mixture, and, according to information received from the Minnesota town is durable and lasting. It has now been down four years, and appears to be giving satisfaction. The Sentinel is not informed as to whether the gentlemen interested will endeavor to introduce the paving in Cottage Grove, but it is likely they will. In this event it would be wise to consider the material well, and give it a tryout in some place other than Main or Fourth streets.

Mankato, where the new paving material originated, paved as follows: The street was first prepared, then it was excavated to the depth of six inches and surfaced. Five inches of dry crushed limestone one and a half to two inches in diameter was put on and rolled down with a 10-ton roller. Boiling tar from the local gas works was applied until the entire surface was covered. Then a layer of broken stone an inch to an inch and a quarter in diameter mixed with coarse gravel, was applied on the surface in the proportion of three parts of stone to one of gravel. This was first mixed dry on a platform and then thoroughly mixed with hot tar and applied on the surface two inches thick and tamped into place to conform with the surface of the street. Dry domestic cement was then applied to the surface and the street was again rolled. Then a coating of sand was applied and the roller again used. The pavement was allowed to stand for two weeks before the street was thrown open to travel.

Steel for the bridge will begin to arrive here within the ensuing fortnight.

DEMOCRATS WANT PLACES.

Several Candidates for Governor Are Being Considered.

Six democrats are mentioned for the nomination for governor next autumn. This is the largest list of possibilities produced by the democrats in Oregon in years. Usually it is necessary to induce a democrat to run, but this year there are an even half dozen willing to take a chance. Jefferson Myers has already announced himself, and is the only one who has formally committed himself. Others considered as possibilities are: Dr. C. J. Smith of Pendleton, who has served several terms as State Senator; Judge Galloway of Salem; Judge Hamilton of Roseburg; John Manning, ex-district attorney of Portland, and Dr. Harry Lane, ex-mayor of Portland.

It is rumored that Myers was sent into the field early with the hope of heading off Harry Lane. The Lane followers do not say that the little doctor will be in the game, nor do they deny that he will. Like the doctor, they are non-committal.

If conditions shape themselves favorably, Lane will be a candidate. There are a number of democratic factions, and several of these dislike Lane cordially, but even these admit that he can get the votes and would be one of the strongest men they could select for governor.

Jefferson Myers's announcement of his candidacy somewhat put a crimp into the ambitions of others who had been nursing boomlets. Myers was put forward by Robert Caples, formerly private secretary to Senator Chamberlain. Caples' activity has raised the suspicion that Myers is the choice of Chamberlain for the democratic nomination. Myers would be accepted before Lane by Lane's opponents within his own party.

John Manning has received encouragement to run, but he is waiting to see what the republicans will do in their state assembly on recommending a candidate for Governor. Democrats make it a rule to wait for the majority to pick its candidates, and then cast around for candidates who can make a showing.

NEW FISH WARDEN.

Grants Pass Deputy Appointed to Succeed McAlister.

The Board of Fish Commissioners has appointed Edward Clanton, of Grants Pass, as Master Fish Warden, to succeed H. C. McAllister, whose resignation, to take effect July 1, was received several days ago. Clanton has been serving for the past two years as Deputy Warden in District No. 2, which embraces all the territory south of the Columbia River. He has been a lifelong republican and a resident of Oregon, and was endorsed by leading citizens of Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Douglas counties. The Board selected Mr. Clanton out of 20 applicants. In selecting Mr. Clanton, the Board took into consideration the fact that at this season of year, when all the hatcheries are in operation and just on the eve of the fall closed-season period, it was an inopportune time to change the policies that had been inaugurated by the retiring head of the department. Inasmuch as Mr. Clanton was strongly in accord with all of Mr. McAllister's methods, it was deemed unwise to appoint a man unfamiliar with the duties.

CROOK AIDS DIVISION.

Prineville Concedes New County to Deschutes Promoters.

Crook county will occupy a unique position at the November election, in that it will be in favor and aid in the division of its own county, evidently realizing that it means more rapid development of its territory. Deschutes, the new county it is proposed to create from a portion of Crook, has the hearty co-operation of the parent county. Several meetings have been held at Prineville lately by committees from Redmond and Madras and representative Prineville people, in which good feeling predominated.

Prineville has promised to do all in its power to have the new county created. In turn, the Madras and Redmond people will resist further division of the county until conditions shall demand it.

BRING FORTH THE COPPERS.

Local Banks Ship in Many Pennies, But They Don't Circulate.

The banks of Cottage Grove want pennies. They are scarce. Every few days a considerable number of pennies are shipped in, and yet it is difficult for the banks to keep the units on hand.
