BOWERMAN CAN'T RESIGN.

Acting Governor in Very Peculiar Position as Officeholder.

Acting Governor Jay Bowerman, whose term in the state senate does not expire until January, 1913, and who is a candidate for governor, is in the peculiar position of a man holding one office and candidate for another office, who would like to resign from his office as president of the state senate, but cannot.

In event of failure of Governor Frank W. Benson to return from the south and should acting Governor Bowerman resign as president of the senate, the state would be left without a chief executive or secretary of state and with no way to fill either position. State government would remain at a standstill, as there is no provision made in the law for filling the office of governor, further than the president of the senate.

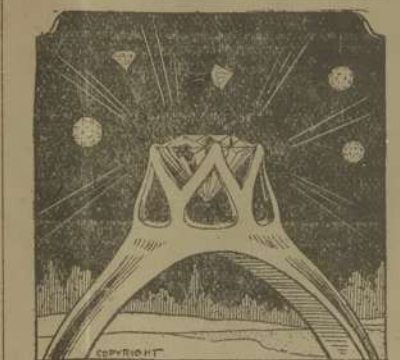
