

SOLDIERS TO THE FRONT

COMPANY E GOES TO AMERICAN LAKE EARLY MONDAY.

Amateurs Will Word Side By Side With Regulars for Ten Days. The Officers in Charge.

Capt. B. K. Lawson of Company E, Cottage Grove, is in receipt of orders for the annual encampment of the guardsmen of the states of the Pacific Northwest, at American Lake, Wash., Aug. 8, to 18, inclusive. In compliance therewith Capt. Lawson and his company of about forty-five men will leave Cottage Grove on Monday morning, Aug. 8, at 1:48 a. m. to participate in the work of this encampment. The orders issued are:

Vancouver Barracks, Wash, July 22,—"I desire to call your attention to the great importance of having as large an attendance as possible at the maneuver camp at American Lake, Aug. 8 to 18. It is fully appreciated that members of the National Guard cannot always conveniently leave their civil vocations to perform their military duties, but it is so necessary to have a full attendance in order to derive any considerable benefit from the camp that every effort should be made to secure the presence of as many men as possible. It is confidently believed that if the members of the militia and their employers can be impressed with the importance of this matter, no difficulty will be experienced, as the patriotism of the American people is such that they would be unwilling to hamper the government in its effort to train the nation's defenders.

Congress this year has appropriated over a million and a quarter of dollars for the maneuvers, and we should do all we can to render a full return for this liberality. As President Washington said, it is necessary to prepare for war in time of peace. After hostilities have commenced it is too late. The conditions of modern warfare require such a high degree of discipline and such thorough training that much preparation is required before soldiers are ready to take the field against an enemy. The maneuver camps are the most important part of the year's training, and no man should be absent if it is possible for him to attend.

It is hoped, therefore, that all members of the guard will make every effort to be present and that their employers will see the necessity of granting vacations during the encampment to these young men whose patriotism has lead them to join the National Guard in order to prepare themselves to defend the nation in the time of the nation's need."

SIX THOUSAND MEN.

Between 1200 and 1400 men will go from the Oregon National Guard and will remain ten days. Simulated warfare will prevail in the field and the troops will have a taste of real campaigning. There is to be a minimum of formal ceremonies and a total absence of purely spectacular exhibitions. Six thousand men will participate. Of this number 3000 are of the Regular Army. The National Guards of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and North Dakota will make up the force of citizen soldiery. The two forces will co-operate, the Guardsmen being assigned to duty side by side with the regulars. There are to be no luxuries in the camps this year. Hard work makes up the programme. Company drills and the like are to be dispensed with. But the training of companies and company commanders is to be taken up on a detailed scale for the first time. Companies, during the first few days of the maneuvers, will be the units and will be given minor problems in attack and in advance and rear guard and reconnaissance. Battalion units will follow, then regimental and finally brigade problems, which will give the senior officers an opportunity of testing their efficiency as tacticians.

During the last few days that the Oregon troops remain in camp simulated warfare will be developed and the troops, seasoned by preliminary operations, will engage in a vigorous campaign, practically living in the field under conditions similar to those that would prevail in a real campaign.

Brigadier-General Marion P. Maus, commanding General, Department of the Columbia, is the commanding officer. He will not assume actual command of troops in the maneuvers, but will direct the entire camp and formulate the problems that are to be worked out, this duty having been given him by the War Department.

These Oregon Guardsmen will remain in the field 10 days, and great benefits are expected to result. In past maneuvers the Oregonians have won high praise from the officers of the Regular Army and the Third and Fourth regiments have been pronounced by Regular Army officers fit for any service. Colonel T. N. Dunbar, recently elected to command, but a veteran of the regiment will be in command for the first time. Lieutenant-Colonel John M. Poorman, of Woodburn, will be the second in command, with Major John L. May in command of the first battalion.

The Fourth Regiment will be in command of Colonel George O. Yoran, of

Eugene, also a veteran of the Guard and of the Philippine campaign. Lieutenant-Colonel John Williams of Eugene, will be second in command, with Majors Frank B. Hamlin and Creed C. Hammond commanding battalions.

MR. ROSENBERG RESIGNS.

Promotion Department Work Continued By Secretary.

At a recent meeting of the promotion department of the Commercial club Mr. F. H. Rosenberg, who had been in charge of the publicity work during the past three months, tendered his resignation, and the work will be carried on temporarily by the secretary of the department. From present indications there will be a considerable number of visitors to Cottage Grove during the fall colonists' rates, many letters giving this information being received by the club almost daily, some of which state that the writers intend to come with the intention of locating permanently. The community booklet issued by Cottage Grove has attracted widespread attention among Easterners and is doing its work most satisfactorily. At the present time the promotion department is carrying on advertising in outside publications, but contemplates doing so in the very near future. This seems necessary to compete with other progressive communities that are alive in securing population and new industries.

Clover, Pigs and Better Fruit.

An experiment that has been tried in one of the orchards of the Walla Walla valley and has been found successful, bids fair to make a new side line for orchardists. It has been found that where clover is planted in the orchard the size and color of the fruit is improved. The experiment was made in an orchard where the crop was thought to be slightly under standard. Half the orchard was set in clover, a fourth left for clean cultivation, and a fourth was mulched with barnyard manure. The clovered fruit did best, with pigs running loose among the trees and keeping fat on the clover and windfalls. The manured trees did much better than did the cultivated land. Deducting from this experiment, several orchardists have decided to sow their orchards to clover and raise hogs on the side. The cost will be no more, as the clover will keep the weeds down and render cultivation unnecessary. And he orchardists will realize a handsome side profit from the pigs.

Big Mill Shuts Down.

Wilbur Hyland, who has the contract of bringing a large log drive down the Willamette River for the Booth-Kelly mill at Springfield, has been forced to give up the contract because of the low stage of the water, making it impossible to get the logs over the shallow places. He will have to wait until the water rises in the fall. This necessitated closing down the big mill at Springfield, as it depended upon these logs to keep going during the summer. The company has several large logging crews in the woods above Wendling, but it requires all their time getting out logs for the mill there.

Oil Fakes Are Many.

California is infested with a multitude of fake oil companies, some of which have extracted from Oregon investors many hundred thousand dollars. Lewis Aubury, State mineralogist of California, has sent broadcast a warning to investors which is assured careful Oregon perusal. Mr. Aubury urges all to make careful inquiry into the standing of the officers of companies presented, and to get authentic facts about the property, company and plans of work before turning over to the promoters any money.

Abraham Announces.

Albert Abraham, State Senator, of Roseburg, has filed his petition to become a candidate for governor, declaring that he is in favor of the primary plan of Hughes, Taft and Roosevelt as the best means of securing a representative form of government, and asking that after his name on the ballot the following be placed: "Party organization on the Hughes-Taft-Roosevelt plan."

SIX MILES OF PIPE IS LAID

WORK ON WATER SYSTEM BEING RAPIDLY PUSHED.

The Roughest Part of the Eighteen Miles Has Been Covered.—Men Now Working Near Dorena.

By the close of the present week the American Light & Water Company will have finished laying six miles of pipe for the new \$100,000 mountain water system now under construction. This stretch is from the intake on Layng creek towards Cottage Grove, and is the most difficult to build, the cuts being heavy at several points, with large boulders in the trenches. It has been impossible to make the fills other than by shoveling, whereas much of the remaining work can be done with teams and scrapers. There is still a considerable distance the other side of Dorena to ditch in order to connect with the work now being done at that place.

Mr. Ulen, of the American Light & Water Company, has gone to Wyoming on business, and from there will go to Chicago and Indianapolis before returning to Cottage Grove.

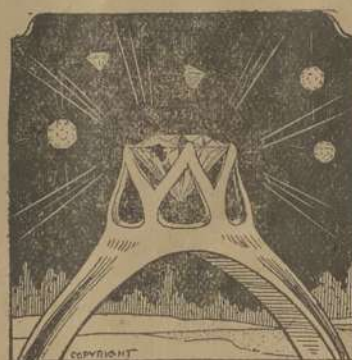
