

SOCIALISTS NAME A TICKET

CONVENTION HELD AT EUGENE AND CANDIDATES SELECTED

Ben. Morse Is Nominated for Representative and B. F. Kempf For County Judge.

The socialists of this county held their county convention at Eugene on Wednesday and nominated a complete county ticket, as follows:

For joint senator from Linn and Lane counties, A. E. Wheeler of Walton.

For Lane county senator, E. F. Emmons of Springfield.

For representatives (3), Ben Morse of Cottage Grove, H. M. Shaw of Eugene, Max Burgholzer of Bailey.

For county judge, B. F. Kempf of Cottage Grove.

For sheriff, J. Muhr, Jr., of Blanton.

For county clerk, G. F. King.

For county commissioner, Wm. T. Cornelius of Goshen.

For Coroner, Martin Miller of Eugene.

For surveyor, O. N. Todd.

The Socialists of Lane county, while comparatively weak numerically, have a harmonious organization. At the county convention held in Eugene, Cottage Grove was well represented, and the nominations for representative and county judge were given to this city. The following platform in brief, was adopted:

"We demand that senate of the United States and state senates be abolished, for they are offsprings of the house of the English Lords.

"We demand that the president's cabinet and the United States courts be made elective by the people and subject to the recall of the people.

"That the assumption of power of the courts to annul laws passed by the people or representatives be abolished.

"We demand the repeal of the Dick military law, which requires compulsory service, for it should be voluntary.

"We demand that the state shall purchase all lands sold for taxes and the same shall become part of the public domain.

"We demand the extension of the inheritance tax graduated in proportion to the amount of the bequest and the nearness of kin, and that the proceeds be used to erect public industries of articles of daily use."

STOCK YARD NEEDED.

Cottage Grove Has No Facilities for Shipping Live Stock.

Mr. J. F. Turner of Portland, senior member of the live stock commission firm of Turner & Strickland, was in Cottage Grove yesterday, having come hither for the purpose of buying a carload of steers from Bartels & Company. To a representative of The Sentinel Mr. Turner said comparatively little live stock is being shipped from this locality this year. Last year Southern Lane made a very creditable showing in the way of shipping, but this has dropped off to almost nothing. One reason for this is that Cottage Grove is without a loading yard, stock from this section having to be driven to Creswell to load. Mr. Turner is anxious to get some business here, and interesting the Portland exchange in the matter of a yard. With the aid of the Commercial club and local buyers this should be brought about.

OPERATION BIG SUCCESS.

Bloodless Surgical Lorenz Treatment Lengthens Leg 1 1-2 inches.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—The delegates to the convention of the American Osteopathic Convention spent the afternoon in a trolley tour of the city and its suburbs, and the evening in a reception and dinner.

The condition of 8-year-old Vera Sternemann, who was made the subject of the famous Lorenz operation for congenital dislocation of the hip yesterday by Dr. Harry Forbes, of Los Angeles, is rapidly improving and those in attendance reported to the convention today that the affected leg of the patient had been lengthened an inch and a half by the bloodless surgical operation.

City Engineer Resigns.

APPLE IN THE NORTHWEST

PRODUCT OF FOUR STATES ONE HUNDRED MILLIONS.

This Prediction Is Made By Spokane Man Who Has Given Fruit Culture Careful Consideration.

While apples are not yet the principal products of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, those who are familiar with the unrivaled climatic, soil and other conditions believe the time is near when the apple yields of the four states will be worth \$100,000,000 and the culture of the king of fruit will be the chief industry.

H. L. Moody of Spokane, where he is a member of the chamber of commerce and other organizations, said this in an address on "Apple Culture and Irrigation in the Northwest" at the first meeting of the Chicago irrigation association. Mr. Moody added among other things:

"The four northwestern states contain 253,894,760 acres, as follows: Montana, 93,806,080; Oregon, 61,887,360; Idaho, 53,960,320; Washington, 44,241,000. Less than 5 per cent of this land is occupied by farms and the total population is no more than 3,000,000 in an area of 397,700 square miles. More than 500,000,000 acres of this land is adapted to irrigation. Planted to apples and properly watered the minimum crop at maturity would be a matter of 20,000,000,000 bushels, or about 40 per cent of the total crop of the United States in 1909, when less than 22,000,000 barrels of apples were harvested.

ATTRACTS THOUSANDS.

"I mention these facts merely to show the possibilities of the country as proof that as gold was the strong magnet which sent the first American across the continent to the California coast in 1849, so today the apple is attracting thousands upon thousands more people from eastern, middle-western and southern states to the great orchard belts of the Northwest.

"The apple is king throughout the vast northwestern domain, and it is conceded by pomological experts that no district in America stands higher in fruit production. Washington has now more than 200,000 acres in orchards and the value of a full fruit crop would undoubtedly equal \$100,000,000.

"With increased transportation facilities and the steady influx of settlers, the early attempts in the valleys and uplands have become more pretentious and systematic. Irrigation plans have been established by private individuals and corporations and the United States government is expending enormous sums in reclaiming the volcanic wastes which are so wonderfully rich and fertile and so peculiarly adapted to raising fruits, unblemished and perfect in size and color.

DEMAND GROWS.

"Apples grown in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana are in demand in the eastern and middle-western states and in Europe and Australia and the markets are being expanded year by year. Experts in the east who have studied conditions in the Northwest frequently refer to these states as 'the world's fruit basket,' adding there has been established in a comparatively short time a domain where the first foot of soil, properly cultivated and irrigated, is worth more than all the mines from Alaska to Mexico and all the forests from the United States boundary to the Arctic sea.

"Regarding possible over-production in the northwest, I may say that the demand is growing greater every day, not only throughout America, but in Europe, Australia and the Orient. Although population and the domestic demand for these fruits have increased and exports continually augmented, strangely enough, the production of the apple has steadily decreased. The apple crop for 1909, reported to be less than 23,000,000 barrels, for example, was only slightly in excess of one-third of that for the years 1896 and 1900, and much less than the crop for 1905, when the production reached a low figure. The fact that the production in the United States has averaged below 300,000,000 barrels in four of the last five years alone should dispel any thought of over production."

Demurrage Charge Increased.

The railroad commission of the state of Oregon has notified agents of the Southern Pacific to call the attention of shippers of carloads that "demurrage on carload shipments originating and terminating in Oregon from and after August 1, 1910, will be \$2 per car per day." The former demurrage charge was \$1 per car per day.

Goes to Yoncalla.

Mr. David Alexander has purchased the confectionery and pool business of F. C. Coffman at Yoncalla, and took possession yesterday. Mr. Coffman will return to Cottage Grove. Mr. Alexander will also engage in the real estate business.
