SMITH MAKES THREAT GOOD.

Minneapolis Timberman Negotiating for Sale of Large Holdings.

That C. A. Smith, the Minnesota multi-millionaire timber operator, is about to make good his threat to retire from the Oregon field became known by the announcement that he is closing a sale of his interests for the purchase price of \$6,000,000. The names of the purchasers have not been divulged.

The sale contemplates the transfer of title to approximately 100,000 acres for the choicest red fir holdings of Coos, Douglas, Linn and Lane counties. All but 7500 acres of the land carry a clear title, having been in the most part secured through the use of land script. C. A. Smith has been known as the largest individual owner of Oregon timber lands, aside from the holdings of Frederick Weyerhaeuser. He is the principal owner of the C. A. Smith Lumber company, the Smith-Powers Logging company and the Linn & Lane Timber company.

Work to Begin Soon.

The Warren Construction company will inaugurate the work of paving Main street within a short time. Arrangements are now being made to start the work. The company is given, by the terms of the contract, ninety days in which to complete the paving. The contract was signed about August 1. The company's representatives are expected here any day.

Arranging New Lodge Room.

The Oddfellows' lodge will next week commence remodeling the second floor of the Main street building recently purchased from B. K. Lawson. The partitions will be removed, giving a lodge room 50x30 feet, besides the necessary entrance and anterooms. The changes will cost about \$200.
