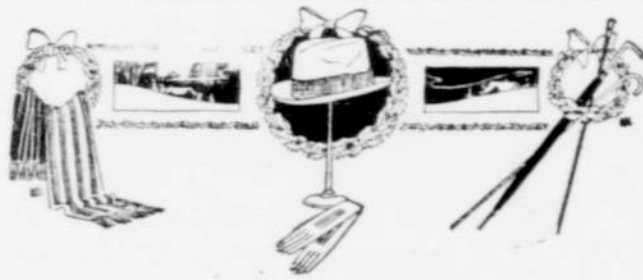

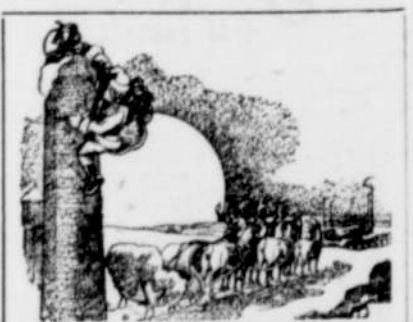
The Lorane fire department was called out Monday to a fire at the residence of A. S. Cole.

### \$310,790 IN FOREST FUNDS IS AVAILABLE FOR OREGON

Portland, Ore., Nov. 19.—The signing by the president of the federal highway act appropriating \$15,000,000 for forest roads and trails, makes available at once \$758,913 for national forest roads in Oregon, Washington and Alaska, and marks an important step toward the development of the great resources of our national forests," said George H. Cecil, district forester of the north Pacific district. "The bill provides \$5,000,000 for immediate expenditure and makes an additional \$10,000,000 available on July 1, 1922, there is immediately available for road

construction on the national forests the following amounts: Oregon, \$310,790; Alaska, \$258,273; Washington, \$189,870. This money will be used in extending the present inadequate road and trail system of the national forests of these two states and Alaska, the development of which is so vital to the effective protection and utilization of their valuable natural resources."
