Every Day Cake.
Put into a saucepan one cup raisins, one cup cold water, half cup sugar, a piece of lard the size of an egg; salt, cinnamon, cloves and allspice to taste. Boil until raisins become soft, then cool; add half teaspoon soda and enough flour to make a thick batter (so that the spoon can stand in the cake). Bake in loaf pan.

Excellent Tea Dish.
A delicious dish for ten or lunch is made as follows: On a very fine wire gridiron place some slices of fat salt pork, cut as thin as possible; on each

slice lay a good sized oyster or two small ones. Broil and serve very hot. This, with coffee, crisp toast or chopped cabbage, makes an ideal lunch.
