RECKLESS TOURISTS USE
RAILWAY FOR HIGHWAY

While Southern Pacific company of officials have become accustomed to the recklessness of motorists, after receiving many reports of autoists running down crossing flagmen warning them of approaching trains, etc., they express surprise and wonder at the latest instance of foolishness—that of using railroads for a highway.

A few days ago at Barnard, Calif., because of snow, two machines oc-

cupied by eight people turned off the county road at a Southern Pacific crossing, at a point where trains are moving frequently in both directions and started down the tracks which had been cleaned by a snow plow. One of the machines had stuck in a switch "frog" and the wheels of the other machine had slipped over the ends of the ties on one side when the Shasta Limited came along. The engineer stopped the train but two car lengths from the first machine.

EDUCATION TAKES HALF
OF ALL TAX MONEY

Oregonian: The state tax commission has prepared a summary of Oregon taxes for 1921 and their distribution. It is worth careful study by every citizen who wonders where his money goes. Incidentally, it may be remarked that a large portion of taxes is due to the citizen's own deliberate act, having been voted upon him by no other than himself. The figures are:

Thus we see that education—state, district, county—absorbs far the greater share of tax money. Educational costs about twelve times the state tax—the levy for the support of state institutions and the state government. The municipal taxes in the aggregate are more than four times the state tax. The road taxes (not the funds raised by automobile levy and expended under direction of the highway commission) are more than four times the state tax. The county taxes in the aggregate are more than three times the state tax.

It would not be accurate, nor fair to say that these proportions represent the exact distribution for each taxpayer. But they show what becomes

of all the tax money. They show, too, that the state tax, contrary to general impression, is one of the least onerous.

The state tax (leaving out of consideration the millage taxes voted by the people) has grown less rapidly than any other.

Special efforts to clear up the claims of ex-service men and the rendering of every possible assistance to disabled former veterans of Lane county will be emphasized in the activities of the Lane county chapter of the American Red Cross, according to plans outlined at the first meeting of the new year, held in Eugene Monday evening, which was attended by C. M. Shinn from here.

Mr. Shinn and Mrs. R. E. Job are the county representatives from this city.

Meisner Granted Divorce.

A. S. Meisner was granted a divorce last week from Mary Meisner. They formerly lived here and later moved to Eugene, where both sued for divorce, filing complaints on the same day. Mr. Meisner was given the custody of the three children.

Lane County School House Shown.

The New Year's edition of The Oregonian contained an article on the state rural school system written by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent. When he was requested by The Oregonian to write the article, Mr.

Churchill asked a number of county superintendents to send in photos of their best rural school buildings. Superintendent E. J. Moore sent several, and the only two used of the entire number sent in from over the state were those of the Danebo school and River road school sent in by Mr. Moore.

County Clerk's Fees Less.

Fees collected at the office of the Lane county clerk during the year 1921 amounted to \$283.19 less than those collected during the previous year. Fees for 1920 were \$13,056. For 1921 they were \$12,772.81.
