TWO MILL EMPLOYEES ARE IN ACCIDENTS

Albert Hull Seriously Injured When Flume Upon Which He Is Walking Gives Way.

Albert Hull sustained serious injuries Wednesday evening when the flume from the Woodard sawmill out from Veatch spur gave way while he was walking on it and precipitated him to the ground some 20 feet below. He was also drenched with the cold water from the flume and was for a time in a dangerous condition. He was brought to his home at Latham, where it was found that no bones were broken but that he was seriously bruised on the body over the heart and also along the back. He is resting quite easily now.

The men working at the A. L. Woodard mill use the flume in walking out from the mill. It has been standing many years and evidently some of the timbers had become weakened, allowing a portion of the structure to give way.

B. A. Whitten, an employe at the Western Lumber & Export company's mill, sustained a crushed right leg and foot Tuesday when a truck of lumber tipped over onto him. He narrowly escaped more serious injury.

LANE HOP CROP SELLS FOR HALF MILLION DOLLARS

Lane county's hop crop for 1921 sold for nearly half a million dollars. The crop amounted to 6600 bales and an average price of 35 cents a pound was received.
