**REPORT MOST TRIVIAL ACCIDENT IS THE LAW**  
Crash! Grind!  
Just the noise made by two autos colliding, an occurrence that is common enough in these days of many motorists and business power-wagons.

As long as no one is hurt, drivers seem to think that they do not need to go into the formality of reporting the accident to the authorities, but such is not the case.

Both drivers involved in a traffic accident in which even a dent is made in a fender or a bit of finish is scraped from one of the cars are required by law to report within 24 hours to the city recorder or police station if the accident occurs in the city limits. If it occurs outside the city, the report is to be made to the sheriff's office.

**AUTOMOBILE RAILROAD MAY ENTER LANE COUNTY**  
News comes from LaPine, Deschutes county, that an automobile railroad with light rails is to be built across Central Oregon and that the first unit of construction may be to connect with the Southern Pacific line at Oakridge in Lane county.

The LaPine Intermountain, a weekly paper, "scops" all other papers in the state on this story. The story "broke" in that town at a meeting at which were present representatives of the capitalists who are said to be back of the project.

**LANE COUNTY HAS 1036 MORE CARS THAN YEAR AGO**  
There's an automobile for every seven and six-tenths persons in Oregon. A gain of 14 per cent over 1920 sales was made by the automobile trade in Oregon last year, bringing the total to 5,741.

Lane county has 1036 more cars now than a year ago. The ratio of automobiles to persons is about one to six. Sixty-four per cent of the automobiles in the state are in the Willamette valley, north of Douglas county. Lane county, fourth in the list last year, is now third.
