While the cost of living in Portland in December, 1921, was 58.3 per cent more than in December, 1914, the peak of high costs was passed in June, 1920, when the increase over December. 1914, was 100.4 per cent. Food in Portland cost 107.1 per cent more in June, 1920, than in December, 1914, but in December, 1921, had slumped in cost to only 33.1 per cent over December, 1914.

An appeal to the state supreme court in the case of D. Tarabochia and others, of Astoria, against Carl D. Shoemaker, state game warden, is being prepared by attorneys for the plaintiffs. This is a celebrated purse seine case and the appeal is to be taken from a decision of Circuit Judge John S. Coke of Marshfield that the anti-purse seine laws passed by the 1921 legislature and effective Jan. 1 are constitutional. Under the provisions of those laws, not only are purse seiners forbidden to fish for salmon in Oregon waters, but no salmon caught in purse seines outside the jurisdiction of the state can be brought into Oregon.

The California-Oregon Power company headquarters offices at Medford have announced that the company has entered into an interconnection contract to supply power to the Mountain States Power company for a period of 30 years, which power is to be used throughout the Willamette valley. In order to supply this power, the California-Oregon Power company will construct a 115-mile high-tension transmission line of 110,000-voit construction which will extend from the Prospect plant of the company, near Medford, through the Rogue river and Umpqua valleys into the upper Willamette valley where it will connect with the transmission system of the Mountain States Power company at
