Bum Check Man Makes Good.

Byron J. Merritt, said to have been married but a week, was arrested at Corvallis Wednesday and fined \$25 in the Eugene justice court on a charge of issuing checks without having sufficient funds to cover them. He was accused of giving a check for \$3.50 to W. R. Wallace, of Eugene.

Merritt was also accused of giving five bad checks at Cottage Grove but the holders of the worthless paper would not prosecute him as he had made good the amounts represented on the checks. He also returned the money to Wallace and paid all the costs of prosecution.

Boy "Pots" the "Devil."

Alton (Jr.) Democrat: The "devil" that scared those young people at Hutchinson, Minn., almost to death will not scare any more of them, for a 14-year-old lad took a shot at him and brought him low, the charge from the shotgun hitting him in the abdomen, and he lies critically wounded in a hospital. A \$5000 reward had been offered for the capture of the "devil," who proved to be a Methodist preacher who rigged himself up with electric contrivances which shot sparks from his hands and feet and head, and who let himself down into the midst of the merry dancers by a rope.

Citizenship Denied Alleged Slacker.

Carl Edward Swanson Aldean, a native of Sweden, was denied United States citizenship papers when his application came up for final hearing in circuit court. According to draft board records, Aldean claimed exemption from the draft and did not serve in any branch of the service during the war. An investigation of his reservations was made and as a result the naturalization examiners recommended to the court that citizenship papers be denied him.

The cases of Antoine Dallaguardi, a native of Italy, and August Lunau, a native of Germany, were continued.

Tax Paying Begins.

Collection of Lane county taxes began Wednesday at the office of Sheriff Stickels. It is requested that taxpayers who have received their notices bring them to the office with their payments or if they send in the money by mail enclose the statements with the remittance.

This is quite necessary, say those in charge of collections. Without the notices the clerical force in the office will often be compelled to spend a great deal of time in looking up the descriptions of the different pieces of property owned by the taxpayers.

The first half of the 1921 tax is due April 5. After that interest at the rate of one per cent per month is charged.

County Poor Farm Is Hit.

A change in the management of the county poor farm was recommended by the grand jury which adjourned Tuesday. The report stated that conditions at the farm are bad and that the inmates are poorly fed. The grand jury also recommended that the county court set aside a fund for the enforcement of the prohibition law.

Creswell, Ore., March 1.—Word has been received from Cloverdale, Calif., announcing the sudden death of Rev. W. A. Orr on Sunday afternoon, of apoplexy. Mr. Orr was pastor of the local Presbyterian church for two years.

The Cedars school literary society met last Friday night. Mr. Meisner was elected moderator. A basket social will be given at the next meeting, March 10.

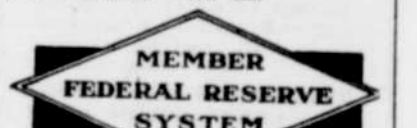

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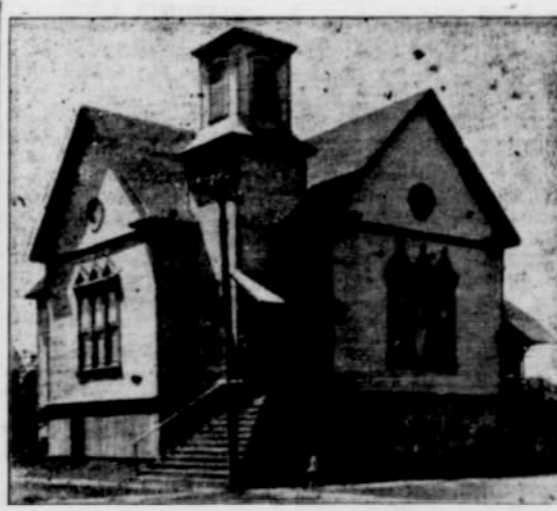
