THREE WOMEN ARE ON CIRCUIT COURT JURY

Mrs. Martha Fisk, Mrs. Agnes McLean and Mrs. Nettie Kress Pennington, all of Eugene, were the first women to serve on a circuit court jury in Lane county, Mrs. Fisk being the first one to be drawn. These women were chosen in the first case up for trial, that of Elmer Russell and Thomas J. Sailor against E. R. Gibson and J. M. Gibson, in which the plaintiffs sought to recover the sum of \$363 on account of alleged misrepresentation in the sale of a span of horses to the plaintiffs. The nine other jurors were Thomas L. Green, Charles M. Emery, Archie O. Knowles, Gilbert Tyson, L. E. Parks, James Lockerie, Arthur Pirtle and Alexander Lewis.

The case lasted all of one day and part of another. The three women who sat throughout the session said after court had adjourned that it was quite an experience for them but they had rather the cases would be shorter than this one.

Mrs. Jennie Higgins, who is also on the regular panel for this term, was appointed by Judge Skipworth as bailiff to look after the wants of the women jurors.
