MRS. J. B. BURNS GIVES INSTRUCTIONS FOR FUNERAL.

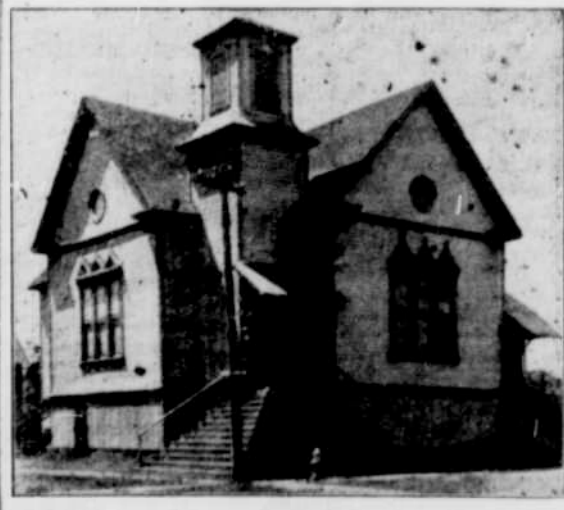
