Whereas, by Chapter 127, General Laws of Oregon for 1919, ground squirrels (commonly called gray diggers) are declared to be pests and all persons, firms, co-partnerships, corporations and companies owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of, or dominion over, any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock which is infested by said ground squirrels or other noxious rodents or predatory animals are required as soon as the presence of such animals become known to proceed at once in good faith to exterminate or destroy such animals;

Now, therefore, all of such persons, firms, co-partnerships, corporations and companies owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having dominion over land in Lane County, Oregon, are hereby required to take steps to exterminate said animals within thirty days from the date of the first publication of this notice. If such steps are not taken, the undersigned County Agricultural Agent will enter upon said lands and proceed to exterminate said animals and the cost of said extermination will be levied against said lands.

The County Agricultural Agent has designated April 3rd as a day to be known as "Poison Day" throughout the said county, and it is hereby recommended that poisoned barley, as prepared by the undersigned, be used for the purpose of such extermination.
