## BONEY AND SVARVEED OUT FOR COMMISSIONER

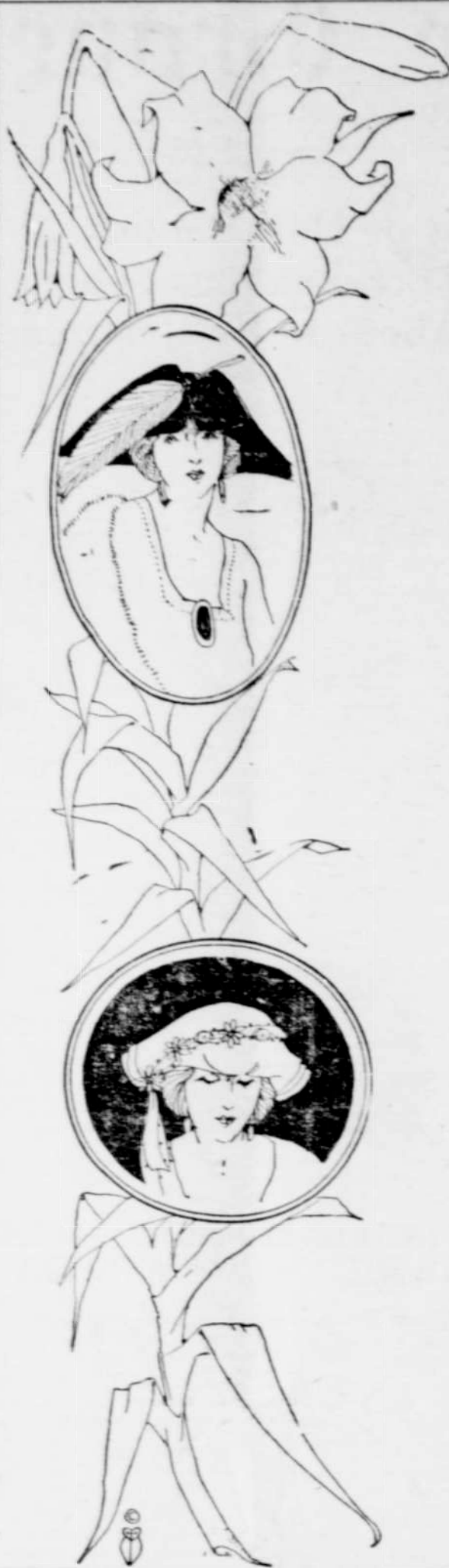

## Tested Recipes

**Light Cake.**  
One cup sugar, 1/2 cup shortening, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon lemon or vanilla extract, milk. Beat sugar and shortening together, then add baking powder, beat in 1 egg at a time until creamy, add salt, extract, flour and milk. Bake in loaf or as layer or cup cakes.

**Welsh Rarebit.**  
When 1 tablespoon of butter is nearly melted in a pan, add 1/2 pounds cheese, cut into small pieces, then add 1 teaspoon dry mustard and a pinch of cayenne pepper, mixed in 1 tablespoon cream; stir constantly, adding gradually 1/2 pint milk or cream. Serve piping hot on toast.

**A Quick Graham Bread.**  
Three cups graham flour, 1 teaspoon soda, three-fourths cup molasses, 2 teaspoons salt (level), 1 cup water, 1 cup milk. Stir up and bake 45 minutes.

## MAGLADY FINDS GOOD BUSINESS AND BAD ROADS

J. S. Maglady, lumberman and candidate for state senator from Lane county, returned Sunday from a trip to California. He traveled through the San Joaquin and Sacramento valleys and found crop conditions to be good and prospects for a high price for the products of those sections excellent. This has a material effect on the lumber business, said Mr. Maglady.

The Bohemia Lumber company, of Row River, of which Mr. Maglady is president, ships a large quantity of lumber to those sections of California. He noted a tone of optimism among the lumber dealers whom he visited as well as among the people in general.

Mr. Maglady said there has been an excess of rainfall in California during the past winter and as a result the roads that are not paved are in worse condition than those in Oregon.

## Food Protected at Eugene.

Grocery stores and other places of business in Eugene will hereafter be compelled to keep such food articles as peanut butter, candy, cookies, cakes and pickles under glass or similar cover to prevent flies and dust from reaching them. The city council of that city has passed an ordinance providing for such protection to these foods.

The ordinance was passed at the request of Dr. S. M. Kerston, county and city health officer, who had noted that many articles of food that are eaten without cooking were exposed to filth and disease.

## DEPUTY SHERIFF SHOTS AN ALLEGED BOOTLEGGER

Tom Fair, of Colburg, alleged bootlegger, was shot in the leg by a deputy sheriff at Colburg late Thursday night of last week and is now in a Eugene hospital receiving treatment. A warrant was issued two months ago for the arrest of Fair, on a charge of bootlegging, but before it could be served he had disappeared, the officers being of the belief that he had been "tipped off" by some of his friends. He was staying at the Hotel Smeed at that time.

Sheriff Stickeb learned that Fair had returned to his home at Colburg and a search warrant was issued. Deputy Sheriff George Croner and two other deputies drove to Fair's home, arriving there about 10:30 o'clock, but failed to find him in the house. As they stood out in front Fair was seen to approach on the sidewalk. Croner turned a flashlight into his face and ordered him to stop, but he fled with the two deputies after him. They called several times to him to stop, but he kept on running and, as he appeared to be gaining on them, one of the deputies fired. Fair fell and told the officers he had been shot in the leg near the hip.
