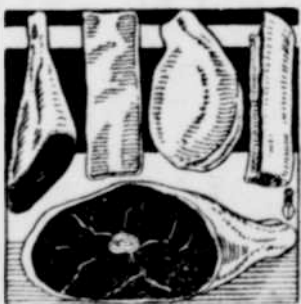

ORCHARD TRACTS SUBJECT OF \$30,000 SUIT

The Lorane Orchard company, owners of large tracts in the famous Lorane fruit belt, are defendants in a suit in circuit court filed by the Alliance trust company to foreclose a mortgage of \$30,000. It is alleged that there is due on the principal of the note the sum of \$25,913 and interest amounting to \$3286.72.

The complaint states that the note was given on April 1, 1912. It alleges that prior to April 1, 1910, the sum of \$900 was paid on the principal and the interest was kept up until October 1, 1920. Since then payments have been made on the principal until there is left \$25,913 unpaid. The trust company also seeks a judgment for \$2000 attorney fees.

Mrs. John Armstrong Turns Table.

Eugene Register: Alleging that her husband, John A. Armstrong, has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner, Mrs. Marie Armstrong, who was sued a few days ago for divorce, has filed a counter claim, seeking a decree of divorce. Mrs. Armstrong says in her complaint that they were married in Eugene June 18, 1921. She alleges that her husband has cursed her and used profane language toward her, has boasted, and that he told her that he treated her in such a manner in an effort to induce her to leave him. Mrs. Armstrong says that her husband is employed as an undertaker's assistant and that he is able to support her but that he refuses to do so. She asks the court for a decree allowing her \$50 suit money and \$100 attorney fees besides \$20 a month alimony.

Cheese Croquettes.

Make a sauce with four tablespoons butter, 6 tablespoons flour and 1 cup milk; beat into this the yolk of 1 egg and season highly with paprika and salt; while still on the fire, add 4 tablespoons grated cheese, removing from fire when cheese has melted. When cold add mild cheese cut in cubes, shape into croquettes and fry in deep fat.
