## CALIFORNIA-OREGON FILES BUNCH OF DEEDS

Route to Be Followed by Power Line Between Springfield and Black Butte Is Announced.

Twenty-nine deeds in right of way of the transmission line of the California-Oregon Power company, being all from Prospect, in Jackson county, connect with the electric plant of the Mountain States Power company at Springfield, were filed for record in the office of the county clerk last week. These deeds cover right of way south of Cottage Grove.

The line extending south from Springfield will be built across country until it strikes the highway at the wheelbar place, near Goshen. It will follow the highway to a point just south of Creswell and will follow the highway from there to Walker, where it will cross the Coast Fork and follow the Delight Valley road to the old ford east of Cottage Grove. From here it will extend south past the Cottage Grove water reservoir, thence across country, extending along the Jordan springs road for some distance and out past the Black Butte mines, crossing the divide into Douglas county.
