SOUTHERN PACIFIC AGAIN ISSUES OUTDOOR GUIDE

Camping, Fishing and Hunting Guide, is the title of a sports booklet reissued by Southern Pacific lines with the aid of the United States forestry service. It has a very striking cover in four colors, is illustrated with sketches and maps, contains articles on the playgrounds in western Oregon, within and without the national forests; directions as to reaching the hunting and fishing places; how to make camps and what to use in doing so. It tells about roads and trails, outfits and clothing, food supplies, recipe, cooking equipment and how to use cooking utensils.

A part of the booklet is devoted to packing, protection of game and fish, the handling of killed deer, how to rescue, revive and carry injured companions, prevention of forest fires, game laws and licenses.

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AUTOMOBILE BUSINESS MAKES RAILROAD BUY MORE CARS

The Southern Pacific company has asked for bids on the construction of 2000 single-sheathed, steel superstructure automobile cars of 50 tons capacity to be used on its Pacific system. These cars, which will be of the most modern type, will be equipped with double-swing end doors and staggered side doors having 10 feet clear opening. The Southern Pacific now has 2107 automobile cars in use on its Pacific system and the new order will be the largest ever placed by a western railroad for this class of equipment.

Commissioner Candidate Withdraws.

E. W. Mathews, who had announced his candidacy for county commissioner, decided that things were getting too crowded, so he withdrew his candidacy last week, leaving only five in the race for the seat to be vacated next January by M. H. Harlow.
