In submitting my candidacy for the nomination of County Commissioner of Lane county on the republican ticket at the primary election to be held on May 19, 1922, I desire to make certain specific and definite statements relative to what I propose to assist in accomplishing.

Lane County Taxes

Although state taxes for 1921 were practically the same in amount as they were in 1920, for Lane county, yet county and local taxes have actually been increased enough to make a \$32,000 net increase for the whole of Lane county for 1922. Thus we see that taxes in Lane county are constantly growing more burdensome, and the only way to reduce taxes is to practice the most rigid economy in the administration of county affairs in every detail of public expenditure. In my opinion, court house expenses can and should be curtailed. If elected, I shall use my best efforts to cut down court house expenses to the minimum consistent with efficiency and business requirements. All county court officers and employees of the county entrusted with the disbursement of county funds should be required to exercise the same economy in the disbursement of public money and the same efficiency in the discharge of their respective official duties as are required by private business enterprises in the conduct of their business affairs.

Market Road Fund

The present Market road law went into effect in 1920. Since that date Lane county has received from this market road fund \$55,918.00 in 1920 and \$56,146.00 in 1921 and \$56,343.00 in 1922, or a grand total of \$168,407.00 within the last three years. Just how much of this enormous sum has been transferred to other funds or otherwise diverted from the use contemplated by the law is not within the realm of conjecture, but certain it is that our market roads have not received the attention to which they are entitled; therefore, I am firmly of the opinion that market road funds should be expended on market roads—which are essentially farmers' roads—rather than on the Pacific highway, which is a state road.

Special Road Tax Fund

All sections of Lane county should receive their just proportion in the expenditure of road money. Special road tax money should be used only by the taxpayers who voted that tax. I am unalterably opposed to the shifting or transfer of such funds after they have been voted and assigned to the budget.

Road Maintenance

I am heartily in favor of road maintenance. The roads heretofore constructed should be kept in good repair and patrolled by men known to be vigilant in the enforcement of the law regulating the speed of automobiles and the overloading of freight trucks. These highly destructive abuses of our public roads can only be corrected by the constant and systematic attention of a vigorous and vigilant road patrol.

Road and Bridge Program

I do not desire to obtain a single vote by deception or through misapprehension, therefore it is right and proper that I should frankly

and openly state my position upon the road and bridge program of Lane county.

Bridge Building

I have followed the business of bridge building for more than 40 years. If elected I shall myself superintend—with the assistance of a competent foreman—the construction of bridges in Lane county. I can do so without interfering in the least with the other duties of the office and thereby save to the taxpayers of Lane county the salary now paid to the bridge superintendent. I am fully conscious of my ability to build bridges much cheaper than is now being done under the present management.

Extravagant Expenses

It is my candid opinion that the progress of Lane county depends largely upon the development of our county road system; therefore, we should at all times guard against extravagant expenses and strive to obtain a dollar's worth of work or merchandise for each dollar expended. Under the present management our roads and bridges are, in my opinion, costing entirely too much money and overhead expenses are out of all proportion to actual construction accomplished. I am decidedly in favor of a less number of road and bridge bosses, therefore, more and better roads and bridges for the same amount expended. For the past several years Lane county has employed a bridge superintendent at \$175.00 per month and a road superintendent at \$225.00 per month. Each of these superintendents has a foreman on each job under construction and these foremen receive a good salary. If elected it is my purpose to see that the taxpayers of Lane county shall receive substantial tax reduction by reason of the absolute elimination of all superfluous bosses and superfluous tax-enters to be found on Lane county's pay roll.

County-Owned Cars and Trucks

The five county-owned automobiles and two or more freight trucks should be used for county business only, not for pleasure, not for private business or by the families of county officials or employees. The unofficial use of these county-owned cars, together with the consequent consumption of county-owned gasoline, should be positively prohibited.

Platform Pledges

I desire that the people of Lane county shall know that I am under no obligation, pledge or promise to any officeholder whomsoever. I am not a member of any political ring or clique of any kind whatever. If elected I will perform the duties of the office without fear or favor and with due regard for the upbuilding of Lane county and the best interests of the taxpayers and I hereby solemnly promise to stand by and faithfully fulfill the above and foregoing platform to the very best of my ability.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

The organization of Stayton's new cannery is progressing at a rapid pace.

The registration figures for Jackson county show a total of 11,203 voters.

For the first time in Linn county a woman is serving as foreman of a grand jury.

A special city election will be held in Monmouth May 19 to vote on a new city charter.

Work of paving the Roseburg-Wilbur section of the Pacific highway began Monday.

One person was killed and 120 were injured in traffic accidents on the streets of Portland during April.

E. B. Pitts, extension specialist of the Oregon Agricultural college, held a week's dairy conference at Klamath Falls.

Twenty-four students from the high school at Carlton passed a day in Salem inspecting the various state departments and institutions.

Miss Harriet Griffith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Franklin T. Griffith, has been selected as queen of the Portland 1922 Rose Festival in June.

Representatives of baseball teams in Eugene, Albany, Salem, Cottage Grove and Roseburg met in Eugene and discussed plans for a valley league.

Resolutions opposing the passage of the McNary Diamond Lake National park bill were adopted by the members of the Baker county chamber of commerce.

The annual central Oregon track meet, with entries representing grade and high schools from Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook counties, was held in Prineville.

Through the assistance of a number of civic organizations of Portland the state training school for boys at Salem will organize a band within the near future.

The mill of the Oakkosh Lumber Company in the Mohawk valley above Mabel will resume operations in a few days. The plant has a capacity of 50,000 feet.

Improvements aggregating between \$50,000 and \$60,000 will be made at the plant of the Oregon Pulp & Paper company in Oregon City within the next few months.

The United Contracting company of Portland has received the contract for building the Mill Creek market road, extending 7 1/2 miles southwest of The Dalles, on a bid of \$51,472.12.

Reports received from packing plants at Astoria indicate that the catch of salmon in the Columbia river since the season opened has been light. The fish average small and there are few of them.

More than 200 laundrymen and wives from Oregon and other Pacific coast states will assemble at The Dalles Thursday, Friday and Saturday, at the annual convention of the Oregon State Laundry Owners' association.

The question of whether the state fish commission's order closing the Willamette slough to salmon fishing will stand depends upon the outcome of an action pending before Judge Eakin in the circuit court at St. Helens.

A movement has been started for annexing a large section of La Grande, petitions having been circulated for that purpose. The section that it is hoped to bring into the city has a population, according to the 1920 census, of between 1100 and 1200.

Albany's automobile camp ground in Bryant park will be free to tourists this year. This has been determined by the park board after a proposal to make a small charge for the maintenance of the park had been under consideration for several weeks.

Hearings will be held at the Multnomah county court room in Portland May 27 on the petition for the reopening of the western grain and hay rates cases. Henry C. Keene, examiner, will conduct the hearings for the interstate commerce commission.

George L. Howard of Jacksonville has obtained the resort permit at Diamond Lake, according to an announcement made by the forestry office at Roseburg. Mr. Howard agrees to spend \$15,000 in three years in constructing a summer resort at the lake.

The first installments of five warrants for loans, made payable to ex-service men under the soldiers' cash bonus and loan act, were issued by the secretary of state at Salem. The ex-service men to whom the warrants are made payable are Laird V. Woods of Dallas, Daymond M. Connor of Portland, Otto W. Heider of Sheridan, Herman F. Pupke of Portland and Frederick Jensen of Portland. The loans were of \$8000 each.

EDITORIAL from the MORNING OREGONIAN

Mr. Williams for Committeeman.

Will H. Hays, who but lately retired as chairman of the republican national committee, pays tribute in a telegram to the service performed to the republican party by the committeeman for Oregon, Ralph E. Williams. Mr. Hays should know. His testimony may be accepted as something more than a mere polite and formal expression of approval, to be expected from one member of the organization for another; for it is supported by the entire committee, which, not many months ago, by unanimous vote of the representatives of forty-eight states, elected Mr. Williams vice-chairman. He is the oldest member in point of service, and it is obvious—it is not denied by anyone—that his standing with the heads of the republican party is very high.

The national committeemanship is a party job. It pays nothing in salary but it carries many responsibilities, and calls for work. Its rewards are, of course, recognition of leadership, and the prestige and influence that go with it. Mr. Williams has been the committeeman from Oregon for fourteen years, and is a candidate for re-election. There is no good reason why he should not be re-elected; there are good reasons why he should be, the most obvious and unanswerable of which is that he has a high place on the committee, is on terms of intimacy and confidence with the national leaders of the republican party, is in line for the national chairmanship, and can, and doubtless will, perform service which no new man, whatever his qualities, can possibly perform.

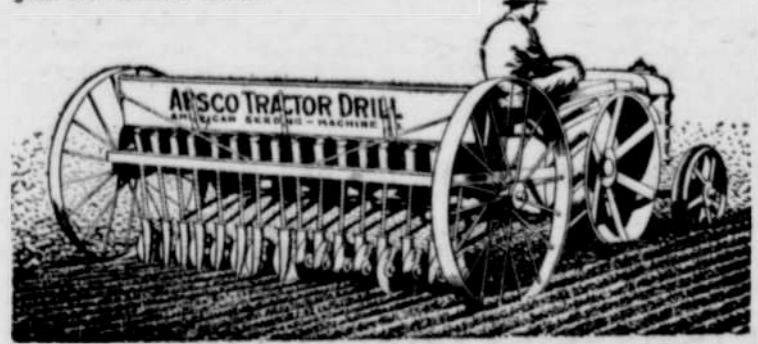
