VICIOUS ANIMAL GOES MAX STEWART, OF DORENA

Max Stewart, of Dorena, was seriously injured Thursday evening of last week when attacked by a bull and he barely escaped with his life. He had gone into the cattle yard to drive a cow into the barn, when the bull attacked him, knocked him down and gored him. Mr. Stewart got one arm around the animal's neck and secured a hold upon the nose ring and hung on in that position until help arrived while the animal thrashed around the yard and jammed the man against a fence. Mr. Stewart's left hand was severely injured and he was so seriously bruised otherwise that he was compelled to take to his bed. The animal is a prize Jersey valued at several thousand dollars owned by Arthur Wells and has before shown signs of viciousness.

WRITING IN OF NAMES FOR JUDGES SUGGESTED

City Council

May 8.—Adjourned session; all councilmen and mayor present.

N. E. Glass gave an explanation of the desire of the petitioners for the grading of Quincy avenue from Tenth street east to the city limits. Owing to the requirements of the council for the improvement to be 16 feet in width, the matter was laid over until other property owners could be consulted.

The mayor reported rough estimates for the paving of east Main street with bituthic at not to exceed \$4 a front foot and \$5 a front foot for concrete. Several property owners who remonstrated against the improvement were present. On motion to advertise for bids for the paving, the vote of the council was 3 to 3. The mayor voted no, and the motion was lost.

First estimate of work on new Pacific highway through the city was received from the state highway commission and the bill for the city's share, \$3986.77, was ordered paid; also a bill for sandry street repairs amounting to \$202.66.
