WHEN SELF-LOVE IS WOUNDED

Then is Called Into Play the Ugliest of All Human Passions, That of Jealousy.

Jealousy is the ugliest of all human passions—and the one which makes the greatest misery in the world. It is the outcome of egotism, the twin sister of vanity, and its brood are all the sorrows of the human race.

But what is jealousy when analyzed?

It is the bitterness which arises either when someone else possesses that which we desire and cannot obtain, or the fear that what we possess may be taken from us by another. The very fact of our feeling fear shows that we know this other possesses a power stronger than our own—and this is a reflection upon our personal merit, and therefore a wound to our self-love, says Elinor Glyn in the London Times.

Men and women are jealous when another approaches one they love—their natural egotism is wounded by the inference that this other has not realized their own worth, and dares to dispute their sway—jealousy being roused to fury should the one they love respond to alien glances, because the wound to self-love is deeper still in that case, and the poison sinks into the very being.

But jealousy between the sexes is a more pardonable fault than any other form of the virus, because it goes back to the instinct of self-preservation and, in the broader sense, race-preservation, and although its indulgence produces misery and crime, its origin is not altogether base or wholly egotistical.

"ANGEL" WANTED THE MONEY

Electioneering Expenses in France.

Whereas electioneering in Great Britain is nothing like so expensive as it used to be, the tendency in France is all the other way, for there is no limit imposed on the amount a candidate may spend. In an article advocating the need of a law to restrict election expenses M. Jean Barnard remarks: "My old friend Floquet told me that in 1891, when he was first elected for the Eleventh arrondissement of Paris, the election cost him only 1,500 francs. At the general election of 1891, when he was defeated, Floquet spent 25,000 francs, and I had to spend even more than that when I stood for the same constituency in 1910. My opponent's victory on this occasion is said to have cost him 200,000 francs, and I believe that estimate to be by no means exaggerated."—Manchester Guardian.

To Tell If She Loves You.

Some one has invented an instrument by which the quality of love may be measured by observing the exaggerated effect of the lover's presence on the heart action of his lady.

Such was the announcement of the Society for Electrical Development in describing the workings of the "telegraphone," an instrument by the use of which, its inventor declared, unhappy marriages would be prevented.

All that is necessary to insure results, the inventor explained, is for the doubt-torn swain to adjust the device over the heart of his intended, whisper a well-calculated word into her ear and watch the indicator. If it flutters violently, then all is well and the banners may be published, but if not, beware!

Improved Pumping Machine.

On Isle Isle, the municipal playground of Detroit, there is a peculiar pumping machine which was improvised for the purpose of draining the water from the canals on the island. These canals are drained and cleared of refuse each year in preparation for the skating season. The machine, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, is a box, three feet wide and twenty feet long, open at the ends and mounted on two wagon wheels at the center. At each end are two sprocket wheels. Endless chains pass over these sprockets and through the box. On the chains, at intervals of 14 inches, paddles are attached.

The war to eradicate the pine beetle in Klamath county has started with the opening of two camps for the training and instruction of cruisers and spotters, whose work will be to search for infected trees.

J. E. Calavan, industrial club field agent for Oregon, while passing two weeks in Grant, Crook, Deschutes, Baker and Union counties organized a large number of new industrial clubs and inspected the work of others.

At an adjourned meeting of the highway commission in Portland work on 70.41 miles was awarded to contractors, the sum involved on these jobs aggregating \$888,536. These were bids which were opened by the commission last week and which were taken under advertisement.

The 79th anniversary of Founders' day will be celebrated at Champeon, on the east bank of the Willamette river, 33 miles south of Portland, May 6. Judge P. H. D'Arcy of Salem, pioneer of 1858, and past president of the Oregon Pioneer association, will be president of the day.

The eight-hour day in the industries of Oregon, Washington and Idaho was advocated by the district board of the Four Le in session at Bend, which adopted a resolution addressed to the board of directors of the general organization asking legislation on this point in each of the states named.

Assurance that the Oregon, California and Eastern railway, "the Strahorn line," will resume construction within 60 days if the city of Klamath Falls will grant a year's extension of the contract, under which \$300,000 was subscribed by the city to finance the road, was received from R. E. Strahorn.

A new trestle 150 feet high at the highest place and 1700 feet long has just been completed by Harry McCormack, contractor, for the Columbia & Nehalem River railroad above the David creek logging camp. The trestle has a reverse curve and is part piling and part bent work. The cost was slightly more than \$30,000.

Printing of the first of the 18 separate pamphlets containing the statements of the various republican candidates for state and district offices at the primary election May 19 has been completed. Copies of this pamphlet were mailed to voters in Baker, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Sherman, Wallowa and Wheeler counties.

Declaring that hog production in the northwest falls far short of supplying the local demand for pork, C. M. McAllister, special representative of the Portland Union Stockyards company, was in Redmond conferring with County Agent Jamison. The company plans to cut out all good female stock bought at the yards and ship to northwest points.

The body of Frank Bowker, Portland musician, was found in the Calapalooa river, near Albany. The river had been dragged since Russel Hecker, former Albany youth, told the police he threw the body into the stream from a bridge. Hecker, who is held on a charge of first degree murder, is accused of having killed Bowker Sunday night while on a trip from Portland.

Letters to the Portland Chamber of Commerce asking that organization to rescind its action in indorsing the movement started by the park bureau to include Diamond lake in the Crater Lake National park, have been written by Roseburg business men, who state that the placing of Diamond lake under the jurisdiction of the park service is a blow to Douglas county. Its withdrawal would take some of the finest stock range away from the stockmen of the county.

Continued improvement in the lumber industry of the northwest in the last week is shown by the report of the West Coast Lumbermen's association. During the week new business was 23 per cent above production, reaching the highest tide of the year. Production was only 4 per cent below normal and shipments were 11 per cent below new business. The 190 mills reporting to the association for the week ending April 15 manufactured 79,667, 310 feet of lumber; sold 97,198,575 feet, and shipped \$6,278,275 feet.

The state irrigation securities commission has rejected the contract submitted by the Jefferson water conservancy district, formerly the north unit of the Deschutes project, providing for the sale of \$5,000,000 of bonds at 83 cents on the dollar and construction of the irrigation works at an estimated cost of approximately \$6,000,000. The commission suggested that the district present another contract. The district comprises 106,000 acres of irrigable land, and is one of the largest irrigation projects in the northwest.

The bureau of the census has announced that the cost of government for the state of Oregon for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1920, amounted to \$21,021,349, which was a per capita cost of \$26.74. In 1917 the per capita cost was \$5.82 and in 1914, \$6.40. The per capita costs for 1920 consisted of expenses of general departments, \$6.47; payments for interest, 66 cents; and for outlays, \$17.66. The total revenue receipts in 1920 were \$16,046,614, or \$18.79 per capita. For the fiscal year the per capita excess of governmental costs over revenue receipts was, therefore, \$12.95.
