**COMPLETION OF HIGHWAY CONCRETE SOON TO START**

The Independent Asphalt company, which laid the concrete pavement between Goshen and Walker last year, will start at once on the work of paving the short stretches between Goshen and Creswell left unpaved last year on account of allowing several fills to settle.

Just what provision will be made for a detour around the Camas swale section has not been determined. County Engineer Morse thinks the only logical thing to do is to build a temporary road through the pasture on the east side of the highway and a temporary bridge over the swale. The detour road through Cloverdale used last year will not be available this year as it is being rebuilt and macadamized by the county court.

**Would Move Navigation Head.**

It has been a long time since anyone has heard a boat whistling on the Willamette in the vicinity of Eugene, yet the fact that Eugene is officially the head of navigation as far as the archives of the federal government are concerned is causing trouble to Harrisburg people. They want a bridge across the Willamette and a bridge over a navigable stream must be so constructed as to permit the passage of vessels. For that reason residents of that city are endeavoring to have the theoretical head of navigation moved north far enough to permit the construction of a bridge without reference to vessels that never pass, either in the night or day.

**State and County Reach Agreement.**

Eugene, Ore., May 19.—A tentative agreement between the Lane county court and state highway commission regarding the payment of the much mooted \$60,000 bill which the commission has against the county for grading certain portions of Pacific highway has been reached, according to announcement yesterday by County Judge C. P. Barnard. All road contracts and a bridge contract in which the state and county are to cooperate have been held up pending a settlement.

**Harris & Allen Mill to Resume.**

W. G. Allen has been appointed receiver of the property of the Harris & Allen saw mill, located near Latham, which was attached 10 days ago for wages due employees. It is understood that Mr. Allen was not a party to the suit instituted by the employees, except as a partner of Mr. Harris, having paid his portion of the indebtedness. As receiver he will liquidate the remaining indebtedness and resume operations.

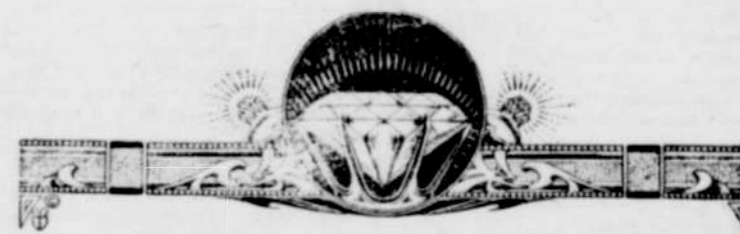
