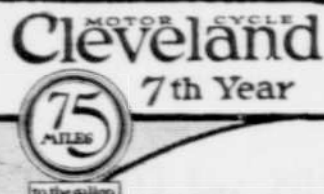

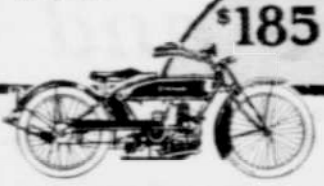

The temporary restraining order enjoining striking longshoremen from employing violence or intimidation in their efforts to dissuade strikebreakers from working on the Portland docks was made permanent by order of Circuit Judge Bagley of Hillsboro sitting in Portland.

By a vote of 118 to 2, striking timber workers of Klamath Falls rejected a proposal of the mill operators to resume work on a nine hour day, the hours not to be increased during the 1922 season, but not to be decreased until a majority of the California lumber working plants returned to an eight hour basis.

The Dutch Flat reservoir dam, which supplies water for irrigation purposes for land near Haines, north of Baker, gave way last week, allowing water to rush down the Powder river, damaging the county road, washing out three bridges, besides doing considerable damage to head gates and ditches in the bottom lands.

Within two months' time work on the big lumber mill of the Central Coal & Coke company in or near Vernonia will be started. Officials of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway have announced that the new railroad into the 27,000-acre timber tract of the Kansas City company's property will be completed within 60 days.

Swift & Co. with Oregon headquarters in North Portland, has filed with the public service commission complaint against a number of northwestern railroads, protesting what is known as the Fairbanks' Perishable Protective Tariff No. 1. This tariff relates to refrigerator service of packed house products and charges assessed therefor.

A tentative agreement between the Lane county court and state highway commission regarding the payment of a \$60,000 bill which the commission has against the county for grading certain portions of the Pacific highway has been reached. All road contracts and a bridge contract in which the state and county are to co-operate have been held up pending a settlement.

A canvass among the prune growers of Yamhill county to ascertain the condition of the crop has been made and practically all agree that the crop is not hurt by the late cold rains and frost. Walnut trees are showing up good and there should be a full crop of nuts. Cherries are in good condition, but some of the earlier strawberries were injured and the crop is fully three weeks late.

Deputies from the state fire marshal's office, following an investigation of conditions at the Old Soldiers' home at Roseburg, will recommend to the state board of control at its next meeting the purchase of a chemical engine, installation of fire hydrants, establishment of a pumping plant, and addition of several feet of hose, to better protect the inmates of the institution against fire.

The Tumalo irrigation district has received a telegram from Commissioner Spray at Washington, D. C., granting it the water right of Crescent lake. The granting of the right will allow 7300 acres of new land to be put under water, and 8100 acres will receive a surplus. These irrigation projects will cost approximately \$550,000, and with all water rights, work can be started in the near future.

H. J. Elberly, assistant state forester, has returned to Salem after a few days passed in southern Oregon, where he conferred with a number of fire patrol associations. Deputy fire wardens are being placed in the field, and much improvement work in the forests is in progress. New trails are being constructed, telephone lines are being installed and a number of lookout cabins are being repaired and placed in condition for the season.
