## ON GIVING 'SPREE'

Form of Intoxication Once Enjoyed by Indians.

New York Newspaper Suggests the Idea to Citizens of That Great Eastern Metropolis.

It staggers the imagination to speculate on the things that might happen if the list of social diversions in New York were enlarged to include the potlatch. That's a Siwash celebration along the northwest coast that the white man has suppressed by law, explains the New York Sun. A solitary outbreak of it the other day at Alert Bay, B. C., caused a lot of excitement. The principle of the potlatch is gloriously simple.

You indulge in an orgy of giving away your possessions. And you become intoxicated by the act of giving. You get a generosity jag, a sacrifice souze, a benefaction bun. If you're a real potlatch fan you don't stop giving until you've given away everything you had in the world.

The ultimate ecstasy comes when you give away your last stitch and face the world in the sublimely unnumbered condition in which you entered it. Then, indeed, the humble Siwash can feel that he has lived up to Mr. Carnegie's doctrine that the man who dies rich dies disgraced.

But what about introducing potlatch parties in New York? Popularized on Broadway, it ought to beat armistice day. In fact, the day when our leading profiteers and war millionaires compete in a public potlatch will make history and probably call for the police department's new riot guns.

On the part of the northwest coast Indians the potlatch was adjudged by the whites a disturbing and demoralizing institution. For the intoxication of generosity is just as unbalanced as any other kind of intoxication. So it is no longer possible for a Siwash Carnegie to win a potlatch tournament by giving away more than any of his competitors had to give, and thus becoming the most honored man of his tribe.

You see it's a plumb reversal of the white man's idea of accumulation. And in a confused and simple way it is an affirmation of the philosophic truth taught by the greatest sages in all ages, that material possessions are a burden, an obstacle and an illusion.

Chief Billie Assin of the Alert bay tribe of Indians was the cause of the recent riot there. He started a potlatch all by himself. He was quite a rich Indian, Billie was, and he planned to place himself high in the esteem of his tribe. Or perhaps potlatching seizes a man with a religious emotion that impels him to begin giving his goods away.

To evade the white man's law against the potlatch, Chief Billie cut a fir tree, called it a "Christmas tree" and began to play Santa Claus with his property. A Christmas celebration in the middle of February struck the authorities as being probably a camouflage potlatch, so they stopped Billie after he had given away \$10,000 worth of his property, including forty sewing machines, forty talking machines, heaps of jewelry and no end of blankets.

As far as can be learned there is no law against the potlatch in New York. There's nothing to prevent any person with a potlatch impulse and a fat check book from starting a potlatch this very minute, and many worthy persons would gladly co-operate to the extent of lending him their fountain pens.
