Bids on Quincy Avenue Macadam to Be Opened at Next Meeting.

Remonstrances to the improvement of east Quincy avenue, ordered at the last meeting of the city council, which were presented by property owners affected by the order, were overruled at the meeting of the council Monday night and bids on the work were ordered.

The petition, signed by owners of 552 feet of frontage on the proposed improvement, asked that the council rescind its order but the objection was not sufficient to stop the action already taken. Bids on the work, which is to be 8-inch macadam 12 feet wide, will be opened at the next meeting of the council.
