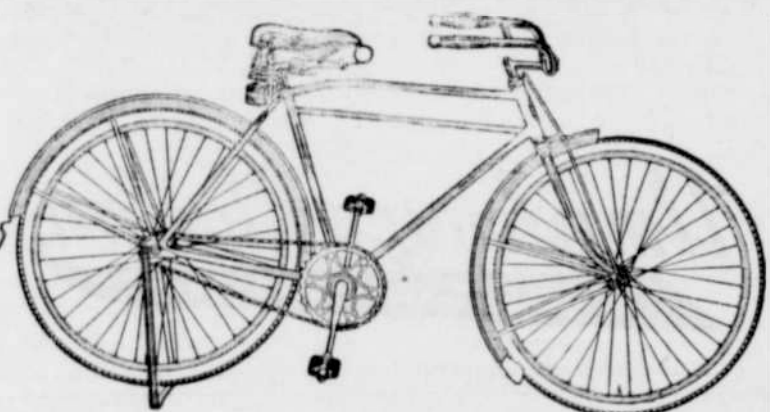

The Dalles.

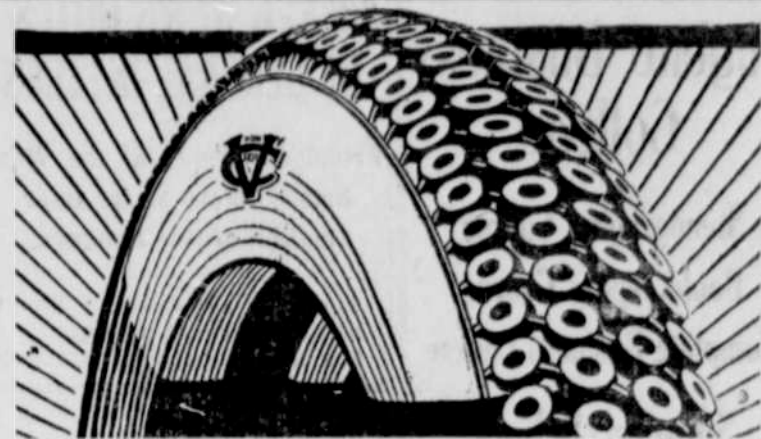

What about
carbon?
