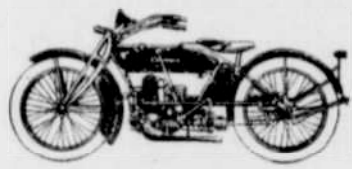
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UNIFORM HUNTING LAWS ARE ESTABLISHED

Open Season on Sage Hens is July 15; August 30 to October 31 Dates for Shooting Deer.

Establishing uniform hunting laws throughout the state, the Oregon state game commission has fixed the following open seasons for hunting, killing or having in possession alive or dead, the following named game animals and game birds in all sections of the state where there is an open season, both dates inclusive:

Deer, August 30 to October 31. Quail and Chinese pheasants, October 15 to 31.

Grouse, or native pheasants, August 20 to September 20.

Sage hens, July 15 to July 31.

Prairie chickens, October 15 to October 21.

The changes in the open season in no way affect the bag limits or other regulations provided by law.
