

An old Roman building dating back to the Third or Fourth century was uncovered by workmen in Grace Church street, London, while laying postal cables. One wall four and a half feet thick and extending downward 13 feet appears to form part of an inner chamber of a Roman building. The outline of the chamber is apparent and there are painted ornamentations on the walls. Museum officials believe that the walls belong to the original forum of Roman London.

There were three fatalities in Ore gon due to industrial accidents during the week ending July 27, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were F. F. Foster, fireman, Portland; Joseph M. Cantrell, quarry foreman, Dufur, and J. M. Holcomb, fire fighter, Portland. A total of 604 accidents were reported.

Unless the Marion county court obtains the right-of-way for the Pacific highway through the town of Jefferson, this part of the road will not be paved this year, was the announcement made by officials of the state highway department. The road to be paved is practically a mile in length. and according to the lowest bid opened at a recent meeting of the highway
