### AGED MAN KILLED WHEN HIT BY SHASTA AT CRESWELL

Creswell, Ore., Aug. 2.—John Elder, aged resident of Mosier, was instantly killed Tuesday afternoon by the Shasta Limited on the Southern Pacific tracks.

A horror-struck crowd of people saw the man meet his death.

Elder had halted across the tracks from the station, talking with a man with whom he was negotiating a realty deal. It was when he left this man and headed for the ticket window that he met his death. He stepped in front of the speeding engine evidently believing it to be a local train which would stop at the station.

The head, one arm and one leg were severed from the body, which was cut in two at the waist. The mutilated remains are in the custody of Coroner Branstetter, who has been in communication with relatives to direct the disposition of the remains.

It is understood that he leaves a wife and grown children, was postmaster at Mosier and also proprietor of a hotel there. He was about 65 or 70 years of age.

### CONTRACT FOR KEM BUILDING IS LET TO ROSEBURG MAN

The contract for the concrete building to be erected by C. J. Kem at Sixth and Main was let Wednesday to L. W. Metzger, of Roseburg. The building will be a modern two-story business block, 48 by 146 feet. Mr. Metzger will be in the city Friday to make preparations for tearing down the present building and for starting construction of the one to replace it.

Mr. Kem's pharmacy and The Sentinel will occupy business rooms on the first floor. A number of other store and office rooms have not been let as yet. The second story will be fitted up for two and three-room apartments.

Final approval by department of agriculture officials is all that is necessary before work can begin on improvement of the Lebanon-Cascadia road at Shea hill, for years the worst section on this roadway to the interior country. The Linn county court has signed an agreement to cooperate with the federal government in construction and maintenance of the highway. Bids have already been received for the work. Linn county's share of the expense will be \$38,000, the government providing a like sum.

The process of handling berries and other fresh fruit by the cold-pack method will be practically revolutionized by the new process put into use for the first time this year by the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association. Barreling and subsequent refrigeration of the fresh berries have been practiced for some time, but this has been supplanted by the use of five-gallon lacquered cans. The fruit is placed in cans in fresh condition and sealed, after which they are frozen hard and placed in cold storage.

The harvesting of winter wheat in Oregon is proceeding without interruption and considerable threshing has been done, says the weekly crop summary of the weather bureau. The harvest of spring wheat and oats is well under way in some localities. Spring grain that was sown early is fair in some sections and poor in others; that which was sown late is generally poor and in many cases is a complete failure. Irrigated corn continues to do well, but unirrigated corn is showing more serious effects of the drought.
