

## PETITION OUT FOR VOTE ON NEW ARMORY

National Guard Asks City to Furnish \$15,000 Toward \$60,000 Fund County and State Aid.

A petition to put a bonding measure by which the city will furnish \$15,000 toward the erection of an armory on the streets by the end of the week. By the present plans for the building of an armory the city will furnish one fourth, the county one fourth and the state one half.

Should the measure be placed on the ballot and pass in the fall election the city charter would have to be amended as it was when the \$10,000 issue of electric light bonds was passed some time ago.

With the passage of the measure the National Guard would have \$60,000 to spend for a new armory here, the city and the county each furnishing \$15,000 or \$30,000 and the state matching that amount.

Prominent business men and members of Company D, N. G. O., will circulate the petition.

### HUNDREDS ATTEND OPENING OF LONDON SWIMMING TANK

Prizes Received From Breeding Associations; World's Record Herd of Jerseys Coming.

Recognition of the Lane county fair by two big breeding associations has been announced by the directors of the fair who have received trophies from the associations for awarding at the fair this fall. The National Shorthorn Breeders' association, of Chicago, has given \$50, \$20 of which will go to the owner of the best aged Shorthorn bull exhibited. Twenty dollars will go as second prize and \$10 as third prize for the best Shorthorn cows with calves less than two months old exhibited.

The other prize is a Seth Thomas mantel clock given by the National Duroe Jersey Record association for the best litter of Duroe Jersey pigs farrowed before March 1, 1922.

One of the features of the fair will be the herd of ten Jersey cows holding the world's record for production of butter fat in one year which the owner, Owen A. Thompson, of Triangle lake, will exhibit.

The McCleave horse show, in which James McCleave and his daughter of Willows Park, Victoria, B. C., are the principal riding artists, will give exhibitions of high quality riding such as seen at fashionable horse shows of the larger cities.

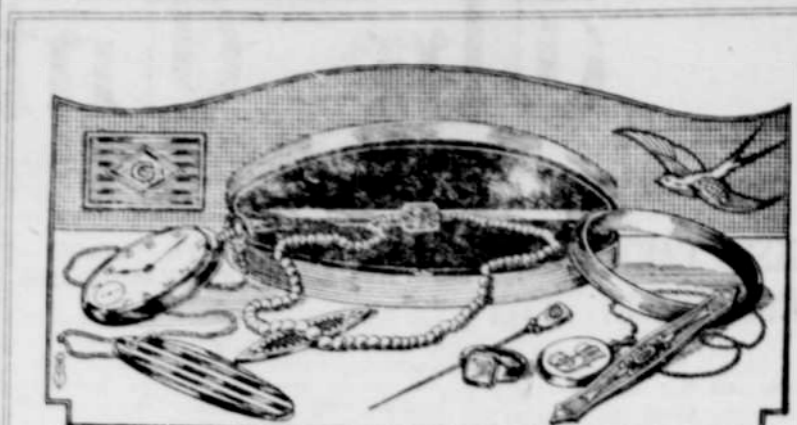
