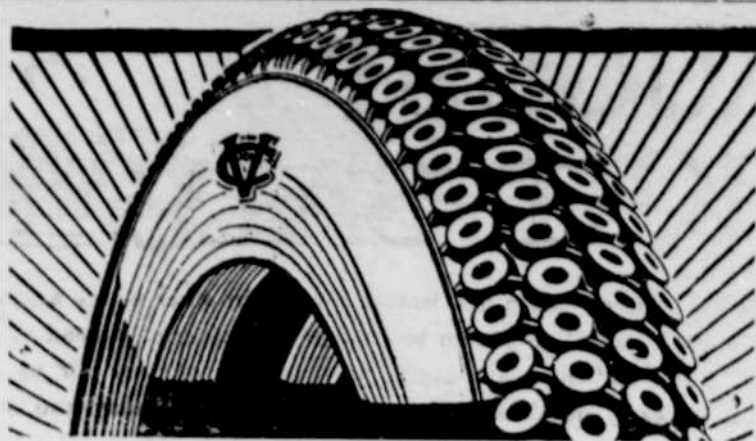

MANY FIRES DESTROY FORESTS OF NORTHWEST

Approximately 700 forest fires have
been reported in the Oregon and Wash-
ington national forest districts this
summer and with few exceptions, they
have been man-made blazes, according
to official reports. Fires as the result
of lightning, which in the past has
been a frequent source of dangerous
blazes, have been comparatively light
this summer but the carelessness on
the part of campers has more than
offset this saving of the federal tim-
ber. With the fire hazard held in
check by the recent rains the timber
officials are checking up on the dan-
ger throughout the Siuslaw and Cas-
cade forest reserves.

Cucumber Is Large Specimen.

A cucumber which weighed 2 pounds
12 1/2 ounces was brought to Cottage
Grove this week by Paul Hetric of
Anlauf. The vegetable was 11 inches
in circumference and 14 1/2 inches in
length. It was raised near Yoncalla

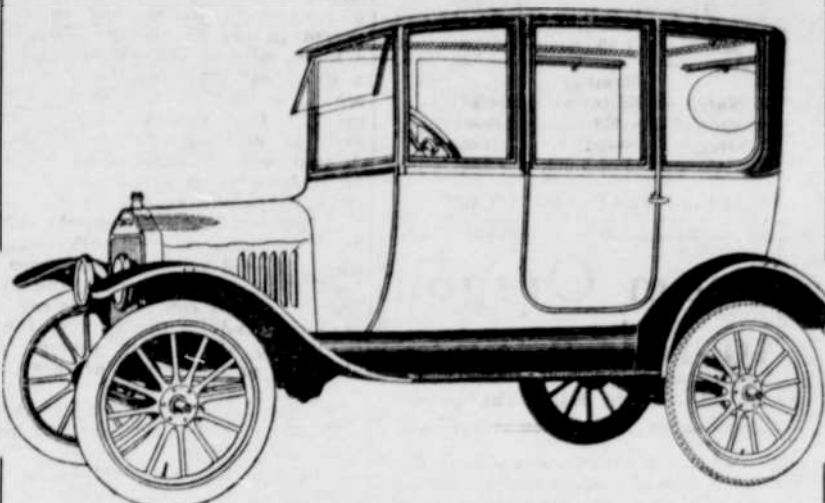
