LANE COUNTY FREE FROM CONTAGIOUS DURING AUGUST

Contagious diseases decreased during the month of August and with the exception of a slight epidemic of typhoid in the Coburg district the showing for the month was excellent according to the report of Dr. S. M. Kerron, county health officer. In the Coburg district 12 cases of typhoid were reported but there is no fear of an increase as a warning has been issued to boil all water used until such time as it is declared free of typhoid germs.

Of the deaths two were females and one a male. The numbers of births was evenly divided between the males and females, there being six of each.

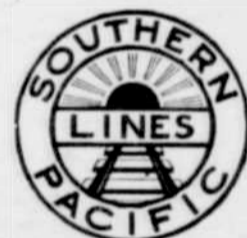
