**SEAVEY HOP WAREHOUSE BURNS; LOSS IS \$50,000**

Fire destroyed the hop storage warehouse on John H. Seavey's farm a short distance above Springfield on the Willamette river late Friday night, entailing a loss estimated at \$50,000.

Men were at work baling the hops and about 400 bales were stored there besides large quantities not yet baled. Picking had just been completed at the yard.

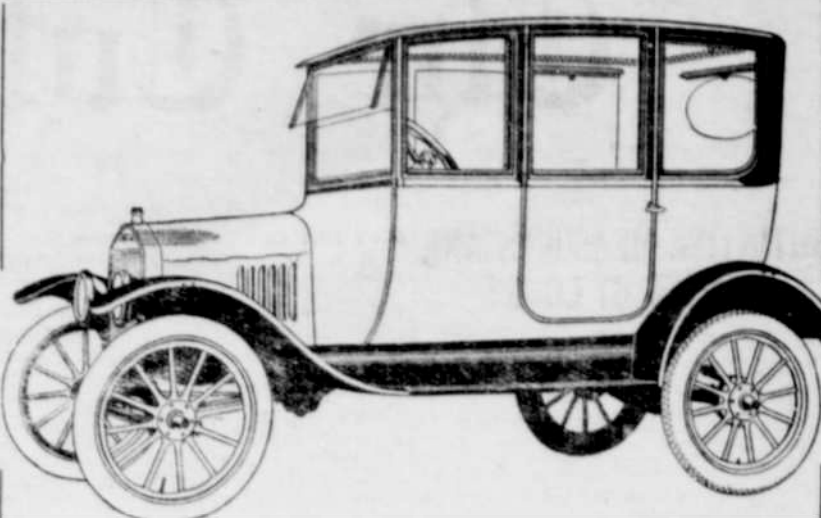
The origin of the fire seems to be a mystery and an investigation is being made. The insurance carried on the building and contents will not cover the loss, says Mr. Seavey.

When the fire was discovered by the night crew at work in the hop house, it was too far gone to do anything with and the efforts of the men were directed to saving equipment about the place.

John Seavey is one of the pioneer hop growers of Lane county and formerly was associated with his brothers in the operation of the large yard over on the McKenzie river now operated by James W. Seavey. The brothers are the largest hop growers in this part of the Willamette valley.

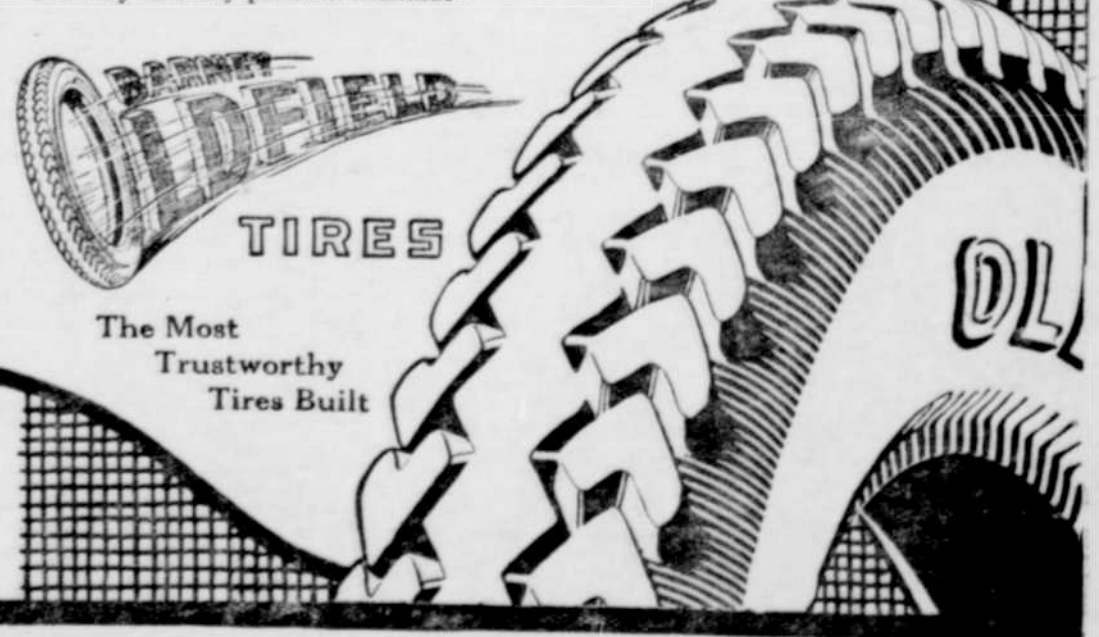
