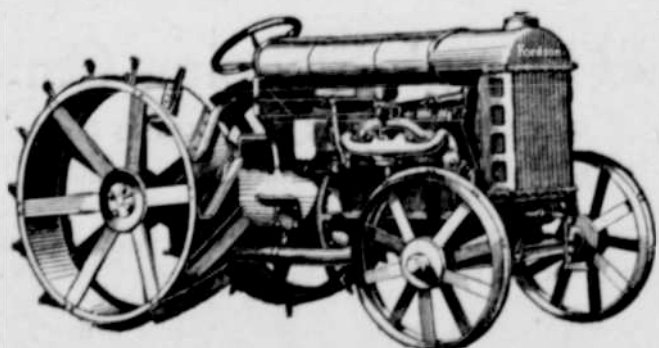

A great deal is being said about the added burden of taxation if the compulsory school measure should become a law.

We saw a statement a few days ago that 7% of the children in Oregon were attending private schools. Taking this statement as a basis, let us see how much of an added burden the taxpayer would have to carry.

Taking as an average thirty to thirty-five pupils to a room, or one hundred to three rooms, this would give us seven more pupils in three rooms, or an average of two and one-third pupils more to the room.

You of the rural schools, on whom the burden of taxation is so heavy, make a poll of your district and see just how many are attending private schools from your neighborhood. See if the expenses of running your schools would be increased one dollar by taking care of them in the public schools.

Do not let the opponents of the measure shake a red flag before your eyes without doing your own thinking.

The extra cost of handling this 7% would be almost unnoticed and would be repaid over 100% by bringing up to full citizenship, unbiased and unprejudiced by private or sectarian education.

The burdens of life and competition are hard enough. Let us give our children all an equal chance and see what an elementary education brings them.

Let us not encourage class citizenship by allowing the children of the rich to be taught in private schools, where dancing and the proper way to use a fork and spoon are as important to their curriculum as the fundamentals are in our public schools.

Let all Oregon children toe the same mark, spell the same words, and he who leaves off head most times take the applause of our populace because he has earned it.
