### PIONEERS DEFEND SHARP.

Cottage Grove, Ore., Oct. 12.—(To the Editor.)—Among the whole number of pioneer families in the territory tributary to Cottage Grove there is not one but what is amazed and justly indignant at the inexcusable bitterness of the allegations with which Commissioner Sharp is charged.

Many of us were his playfellows and schoolmates in his childhood and have known him intimately all his life and we have never before known him to be accused of any one or more of the reckless charges to be found in the recall petition now being circulated against him. Some of these allegations we already know to be absolutely false, therefore we feel justified in assuming that all of them are wholly untrue.

The allegation that "He has obstructed county business" is incapable of a dual interpretation. It reads but one way and means but one thing, namely: that he has steadfastly refused to give his official sanction to a large number of the irregular, illegal and inexcusable disbursements of Lane county's public funds to county employees—otherwise known as county excesses and harrachies—and on projects not warranted by any public exigencies.

We elected Mr. Sharp on a platform containing certain specific pledges of economy in the disbursement of Lane county's public funds. That he has had the courage to steadfastly refuse to become a particeps criminis to useless waste and extravagance is largely due to the almost daily admonition of the subscribers hereto as well as to the constant advice of his large army of friends and supporters throughout Lane county "to stand squarely and firmly by the platform upon which he was elected and that we would back him to the limit." Having thus pledged ourselves, we may be pardoned for suggesting—in a mild manner—that this is really not Commissioner Sharp's fight. On the contrary it is the people's—the taxpayers'—fight. He needs little learning in the law because the ordinary motorist would rather pay a fine and be on his way than stop to fight an unjust charge. This justice, however, ran up against a buzz saw when a St. Paul attorney was hailed before the court at one of its night sessions and at the time we left Minnesota it seemed quite likely that the governor would remove the justice from office. The fight had then gone so far that upon leading roads signs had been posted warning tourist traffic to give the place a wide berth. That was a case of traffic regulation being run into the ground.

The smaller the town the more stringent its traffic regulations, it seemed to us, although we never were apprehended for the violation of any such traffic regulations. However, notice could be taken of the effect of traffic laws upon those who are likely to spend money with us. Many places are adopting such signs as "Don't Hurry Through," "Take Your Time and See Our City," "A Reasonable Speed Requested," "For the Love of Mike Be Reasonable." Such suggestions as these leave a much more pleasant taste than the threat contained in such warnings as "Drive Slow and See Our City; Drive Fast and See Our Jail." This warning not only is not original and has lost its grim humor but the tourist who reads such a sign is likely to wait for a more cordial welcome before spending his money.

### CORE ROT IN APPLES FOUND BY COUNTY FRUIT INSPECTOR

Core rot is prevalent in a great many apple orchards of the county, according to Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart, who has examined the fruit in many sections of the county. Core rot is caused by drought and the only remedy for it in dry years is irrigation, says the inspector.

Fully 50 per cent of the crop in many orchards is afflicted and the fruit is not marketable. Core rot is generally not evident until the apple is cut open. More of the large orchardists will have to have an emergency irrigation system for dry years, or take the loss, points out the inspector.
