

CANNERY UNABLE TO CARE FOR ALL OFFERINGS

Plant Was Operated Day and Night During Season to Save Quantities of Produce.

A total of 687,797 pounds of produce, all locally grown, was used this year by the Cottage Grove cannery up to the close of the pear season but the amount may be increased if apples are worked on. This amount is 31,341 pounds more than the amount used last year, when the produce worked up totaled 656,456 pounds.

In spite of extensive improvements made this year in the way of additional space and improved facilities for canning, the plant was hard pressed all season to keep up with the supply of produce furnished. Toward the end of the season a complete night shift was worked in addition to the day force to save quantities of fruit and vegetables.

This year's pack shows 13,025 cases in which are packed six No. 10 cans and 4173 cases which hold 24 No. 2½ cans. The output for the season of 1921 was 15,340 cases of No. 10 cans and 2868 cases of No. 2½ cans.

During the present season the management of the cannery has paid out \$13,249.89 in cash for 434,916 pounds

of produce, \$8,274.46 for cans, \$6507.70 for labor and \$489.76 for wood. The remaining 252,881 pounds of produce was pooled by the growers.

During the four seasons just preceding 1922, 990 tons of fruit and vegetables were canned. Growers received \$76,084.22 for their products and \$32,333.16 was expended for labor. The gross sales from these four years amounted to \$183,106.46.

Canned goods have been shipped to all parts of the United States and to England this year by the Cottage Grove plant. Two cars of beans and prunes went to San Francisco and a car of blackberries was shipped to Kansas City. Recently a car of mixed fruits went to Allen & Lewis in Portland.

The varieties of produce used this season for which cash was paid, the quantity of each in pounds and the cost are as follows:

Loganberries, 25,194, \$1010.12; cherries, 10,400, \$548.58; blackberries, 151,837, \$6201.92; beans, 47,655, \$1170.83; rhubarb, 617, \$10.17; plums, 10,938, \$137.67; pears, 153,525, \$3737.80; Italian prunes, 34,750, \$432.90, a total of 434,916 pounds costing \$13,249.89.

In addition to this the following produce was pooled:

Cherries, 171; blackberries, 10,779; beans, 79,886; rhubarb, 270; plums, 1200; pears, 1466; Italian prunes, 97,109, a total of 252,881 pounds.

HORRORS OF SMYRNA ARE GRAPHICALLY TOLD

Portland, Ore., Oct. 18.—Never was a group of babies brought into the world under stranger or sadder surroundings," states Dr. Esther Lovejoy, of Portland, in a message just received by J. J. Handesker, state director, Near East relief. "I have just returned to Constantinople from a week in the inferno of Smyrna. I worked day and night directing the birth of hundreds of infants. Many were born on the planks of the wharf, the laboring mothers being protected from the panic-stricken crowd only by the thin white line of American sailors. One baby was born while its young mother was standing in line unwilling to give up her place even for the birth of her first child.

"Turkish soldiers systematically rob the refugees, wrenching rings from women's fingers. The quiet of the night is disturbed by piercing cries from young women and girls who are being taken by Turkish soldiers. They desert from their crimes only when the searchlights from American warships are turned on them."

Six shiploads of food have been dispatched by Near East relief, for a population greater than that of the state of Oregon is homeless.

President Harding has appointed Will Hayes national chairman and Archie Roosevelt executive secretary of a campaign for funds for relief of the

Smyrna sufferers who now number nearly one million. At least fifteen million dollars will be needed.

The federal council of the Churches of Christ, the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., K. of C., Near East relief, the Federation of Jewish Welfare societies, all have joined in this life-saving movement, designating the Near East relief as the agency for doing the work. WHITE DAMAGE SUIT ON IN DISTRICT COURT

The case was appealed by White from the justice court. It was alleged by White that Nusbaum carelessly and negligently parked his car by the side of the highway and when White attempted to pass between this car and another one the collision occurred. PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Now Is the Time for Passage of School Bill

Vote 314 x Yes

Passage of the Compulsory Public School Attendance bill now—this year—will insure that a minimum number of private schools and private school pupils will be affected. Of the 36 counties of Oregon 16 are at present without any private schools whatever. The combined aggregate of pupils in all the private schools in five other counties is fewer than 200. The total attendance at the private schools, of the grammar grades, of Oregon is about 9841. The total attendance at the public schools, of the grammar grades, is about 131,689. Surely if the public schools are good enough for the 131,689, they are also good enough for the other 9841.

At present, while the private schools are few and small, is the time to make the change proposed by the public school bill.

COSTS. No tax will be levied for years to come, as the bill does not take effect until September, 1926, and no tax then if the amendment is in the courts for several years.

When all attend our free public schools the additional cost will be slight, for the overhead will be the same. Most of the children will find a place in existing classes and the added expense to the average taxpayer will be nominal. The great benefit to our nation will be worth many times the small cost.

Now is the time to pass this measure, insuring that in Oregon all of our children will be educated to a common patriotism, common ideals and a unified allegiance to our institutions.
