MANY ACRES OF PRUNES AND NUTS BEING PLANTED

Many acres of prunes, walnuts and filberts will be set out in Lane county during the next few weeks, according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, who is being called upon to examine incoming shipments. The Oregon nurseries' stock of nuts is depleted and many of the shipments are from California nurseries. Nuts have been a good yield this year and have brought growers the best returns.

Warning against eastern nursery stock, especially that coming from near quarantined areas, has been issued by Mr. Stewart. "People should be more careful in ordering nursery stock from the east, as a large part of the east is under quarantine for brown

tail and gypsom moth, European corn and Japanese beetles," says Mr. Stewart. Shipments coming here from quarantined areas must be either returned or destroyed.

The Japanese beetle is one of the most dangerous pests and there is no known means of killing it. Last year a shipment of trees coming here contained the root nematode which California is spending thousands of dollars to get rid of. Oregon has enough pests without importing any, says the inspector.
