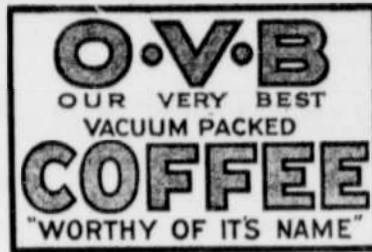
Emmett Sharp and L. N. Roney were up from Eugene Wednesday to attend the funeral of their old friend, Scott Christman.
