NOTICE AGAINST STOCK RUNNING AT LARGE IN ORCHARD PRECINCT.

It appearing from the abstract of votes cast at the regular November 7th, 1922, election, as made by the official canvassing board of Lane County, Oregon, that at said election the total number of votes cast in Orchard Precinct, Lane County, Oregon, on the question "For and against stock running at large" is and was 139 and of said votes, 127 votes were cast for stock running at large, and 127 votes were cast against stock running at large, and that there was therefore a majority of 115 votes against stock running at large in said precinct.
