W. C. T. U. PLANS DAY MEET FOR CHILDREN'S HOME

An all day meeting at which local W. C. T. U. workers will meet to hear talks by Mr. and Mrs. Rambo, state workers, and see for the inmates newly erected children's home at Corvallis will be held in the W. C. T. U. home on north Sixth street. The definite date to be announced later.

A bill has been introduced into the state legislature asking an appropriation from the state toward the maintenance of the home for the children. Care for the children in the W. C. T. U. home would cost less per child than the present cost per inmate in the state training school for boys. At present there are about 20 boys in the state training school who were not placed there for misdemeanors committed before they were without homes and the state had no other place to which to send them. The W. C. T. U. asks an appropriation amounting to \$16 per child per month to care for these children who have no other home while at present the state is paying \$36.15 a month in the state training school. A number of children now in the state school for feeble-minded would not be there if the state had any other place to keep them and the W. C. T. U. seeks the care of these.

Contributions for the home are being solicited, bedding, clothing, sheets, blankets, pillow cases and handkerchiefs being among the most needed articles. Any contributions will be received by Mrs. Sarah Hanna and Mrs. DeWald.

Returns From Father's Funeral.

Frank VanNortwick has returned from Canton, Illinois, where he was called by the serious illness and death of his father, John P. VanNortwick, 72, who died there January 19. The deceased had been a resident of Fairview, Ill., his entire life time except for a few years spent in Canton. He leaves besides his son who lives here, two others, George and Carl. SONS OF AMERICAN REVOLUTION OFFER ESSAY PRIZES

Launch Contest to Encourage Interest Among School Children in History of Country.

The Oregon society of Sons of the American Revolution is offering a series of prizes totaling \$50 to pupils of the public schools of the state for essays on topics connected with the war for American independence. The subjects are "Our Wars of 1776 and 1917, Contrasts and Similarities," "The Treaty of Versailles and Paris of 1783," and "Naval Warfare of the American Revolution." Pupils of either grade or high schools are eligible. The first prize is \$25, the second \$15 and the third \$10.

Essays are limited to 3000 words, must be written on one side of paper only, and must be accompanied by a statement from the writer's teacher that the writer is a pupil in a designated class and that the teacher believes the essay to be the pupil's own unaided work. Essays must be in the hands of Herbert B. Augur, 960 Xavier street, Portland, Ore., not later than April 15, 1923.

Originality, accuracy of statements, manner of treatment, orthography, syntax and punctuation, neatness and legibility will be considered in grading. The writer's name and address, including county, must be given.
